Colorful Fall Fare--Mexican Peppers

| 1 1/2 cups (5-ounce package) packaged pre-cooked rice | 1 1/2 cups drained canned whole kernel corn |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese |
| 1 1/2 cups boiling water | 1 tablespoon grated onion |
| 5 green peppers | 1 1/2 teaspoons salt |
| 2 tablespoons butter | Dash of pepper |
| 3 eggs, slightly beaten | 3 tomatoes, sliced |

Melted butter
 Add rice and 1/2 teaspoon salt to boiling water in saucepan. Mix just to moisten all rice. Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 13 minutes.

Cut peppers in half lengthwise and remove seeds. Cook the peppers in boiling salted water 5 minutes, or until tender. Drain. Place peppers, cut side up, in baking dish. Sprinkle lightly with salt. Combine the rice, butter, eggs, corn, cheese, onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, and the pepper. Mix well. Fill pepper halves with rice mixture and top each with a slice of tomato and brush with melted butter. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 35 minutes, or until filling is firm. Makes 5 servings.
