Eastern Oregon Health Meeting Planned Feb. 2
A regional health conference for Eastern Oregon counties is scheduled February 2 at The Dalles under sponsorship of the Oregon Rural Health Council and Oregon State college extension service.
Mental health, hospitalization, health insurance, county health services, and costs for medical, dental, and hospital care are among scheduled topics. Local arrangements are being made by the Wasco county extension service, assisted by Dr. James Stewart, Salem, of the state department of education's vocational rehabilitation division.
Other state rural health leaders attending will include Harley Libby, Jefferson, chairman of the state Rural Health Council and state president of Oregon Farmers Union, and council secretary Mrs. Mabel Mack, assistant director of Oregon State college extension service.
Mrs. Mildred Hammel, chairman of the Wasco group, says a "people's" program is planned and urges attendance by organization representatives from throughout Eastern Oregon.
In addition to main speakers, the program will feature a skit on mental health and a panel discussion of the "health dollar." Panel topics include: know your county health facilities, health insurance, hospital services and costs, and dental care. Full program details will be announced soon.
This is one of two regional health conferences scheduled in Oregon this winter with a Western Oregon meeting slated for

January 29 at Coos Bay. The annual state conference will be at Salem, March 27 and 28, Mrs. Mack said.
No Shipping Fever Reported From Here
Hood River and Umatilla were the only Columbia Basin counties which contributed to the most common animal disease in Oregon during November. This disease was hemorrhagic septicaemia, commonly called "Shipping fever", which also was the greatest killer of Oregon livestock during that same period, says the state department of agriculture.
Of the over 500 shipping fever cases tallied in the state, four of 20 cases were fatal in Hood River county. One of 90 shipping fever cases caused death in Umatilla county, which had Oregon's second largest case load for this disease during November. Lake county was hardest hit. There, 11 of 175 cases were fatal.
Brucellosis was the second most common animal disease in Oregon during November. Increases in this disease are traced to a stepped-up testing program, says Dr. K. J. Peterson, state veterinarian for the department.
The breakdown on brucellosis reactors in Columbia basin counties was: Sherman, two; Umatilla, four; Wasco, one; and Wheeler, 24. Cattle tested in Hood River, Gilliam and Morrow counties during November were free of brucellosis.
Umatilla county reported five of the state's over 50 cases of infectious keratitis, which is also known as pink eye. This disease was third most common in the state two months ago.
No county in this area had red water or blackleg which were Oregon's second and third greatest killers of livestock in November. However, Hood River county listed nine cases of scabies and Wasco county had four cases of swine erysipelas.
