Wednesday was "Roller Music" for the home extension service when it met in the grange hall.

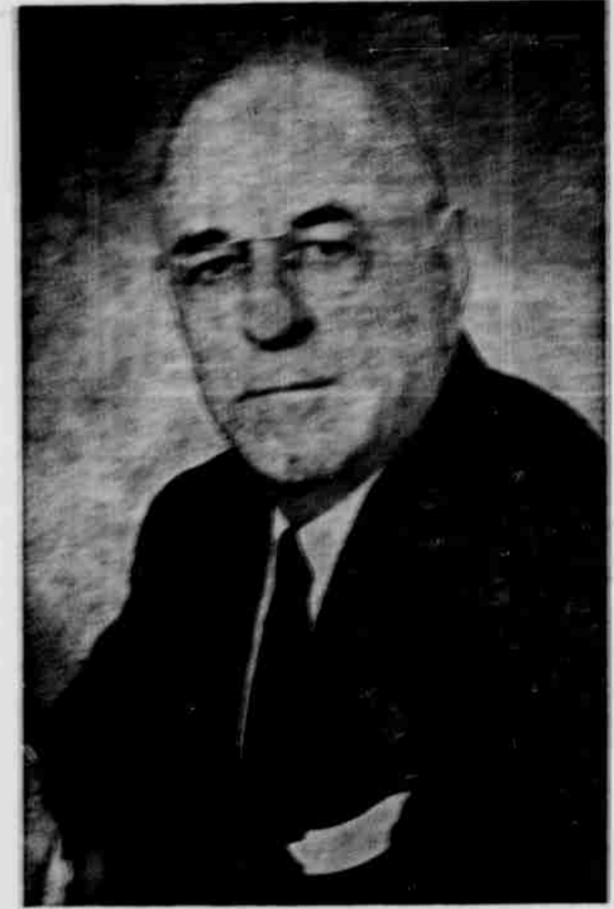
Joe Mellor and Charis Rouch are now driving to Long Creek to work for Alton McBride Logging Co.
