Traffic Accident Cost in State Huge

Traffic accidents in Oregon last year cost the state an estimated \$50,160,000.

The figure, released by the Oregon Traffic Safety commis-sion, represents about \$20 million more than was spent during the year in construction of new state highways and county roads.

This fact, coupled with recently announced boosts in insurance premiums, should point up the "economic necessity of further strengthening the state's battle against accidents," the commission's executive secretary. James R. Banks, commented.
