Ansil Martin drove with Harold Lippert to Portland Wednesday with a load of scrap iron.

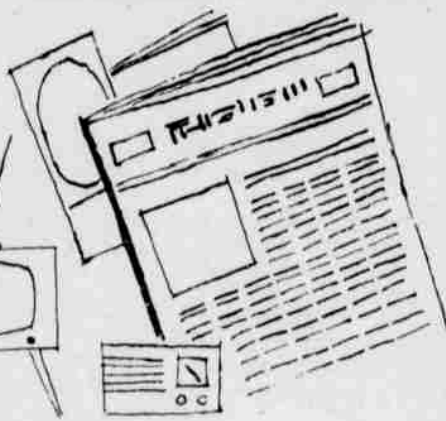
