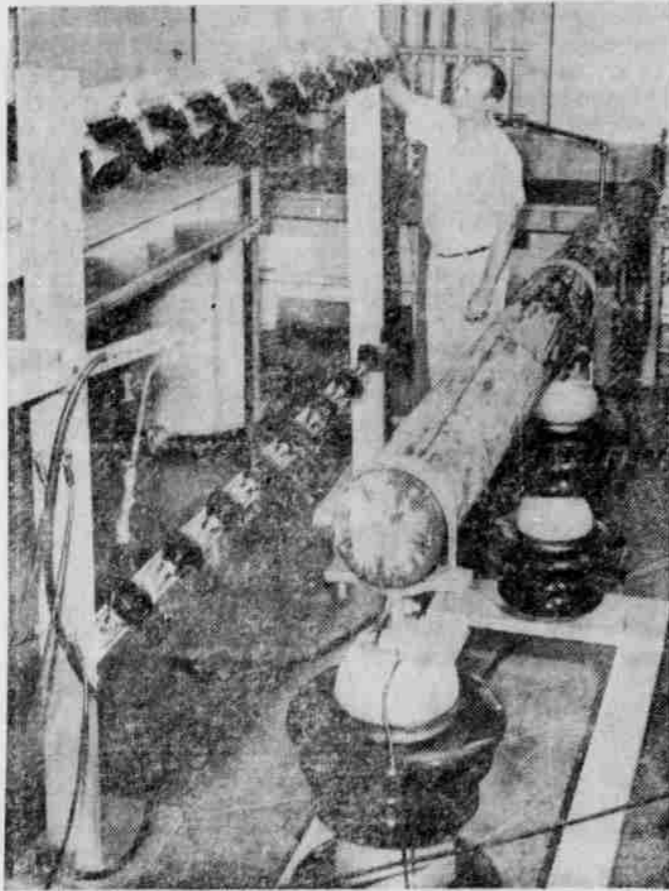

OSC Studies Power Pole Burning



OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The problem of cross arm burning on high voltage power lines has been taken "indoors" for solution at Oregon State college's high voltage laboratory. There, electrical engineers are reproducing outdoor weather conditions in tests on the fir cross arm poles by means of sun lamps, a fog nozzle that gives fog and rain, and lines carrying 110,000 volts. The costly burning occurs early in the fall when insulators on the cross arms have been coated with dust or salt spray, allowing power leaks to short into the cross arm and char them. Don Hill, electrical engineering senior from Pendleton, shown here in the laboratory, is assisting Professor Louis N. Stone on the project. Eliminating the problem would save thousands of dollars annually for power companies.

Stronger "Drinking-Driver" Law Talked By Safety Commission

Support for a new and stronger law governing use of chemical tests for intoxication and an amendment to the current Oregon law of arrest were voiced recently by members of the Oregon Traffic Safety commission meeting in the board of control room.

The new chemical test law, based on a model statute prepared by Northwestern University's Traffic Institute, will be submitted to the current legislature with the Commission's recommendation for approval, according to attorney general Robert Y. Thornton, temporary chairman of the Commission. Thornton said the law, known

as "implied consent", provides that if a driver suspected of driving while intoxicated refuses to take a chemical test his license to drive can be suspended, after a hearing.

Basis for the law is the principle that use of the highways is a privilege which the state can prohibit altogether and thus the state has the right to lay down regulations governing highway use, Thornton explained.

Similar laws are now in effect in New York, Kansas and Idaho and are under legislative consideration in at least five other states.

Current Oregon law requires that a driver suspected of operating under the influence must give his written consent before a chemical test can be administered.

The law has been under fire by law enforcement officials as stacking the deck in favor of the drinking driver who may be too intoxicated to sign a statement or at the stage of intoxication where he is "just plain uncooperative."

National traffic authorities estimate that about 20 percent of all fatal accidents involve a drinking driver.

The commission position on the law of arrest follows recommendations of police groups which want the law changed to permit arrests for misdemeanors on "probable cause" at accident scenes in order to enable prosecution of persons whose violations caused accidents.

In other business, the commission re-affirmed their recommendations to the Governor that a complete study of Oregon's courts should be conducted and voted to seek amendment of House Joint Resolution 3 to specifically provide for use of motor vehicle funds to promote traffic safety in the state.

Governor Robert D. Holmes, who as honorary chairman sat in on most of the two-hour session, said he wants a close liaison between his office and the commission and stressed that when the Commission wants to move in a certain direction it should have the "full weight of the executive office."

The Governor's administrative assistant, Harry Swanson, also attended the session.
