Molasses Glazes Barbecued 'Ribs'



With pork supplies now bountiful at meat counters, many styles of this meat can be economically prepared in the months ahead. Here barbecued spareribs, topped with spicy apple rings, make for a very special and popular menu. Unsulphured molasses in the barbecue sauce adds a fine glaze and color to the spareribs. Unsulphured molasses, the concentrated juice of sugar cane, gives good spreading consistency to a barbecue sauce. Its aromatic and sweet flavor also offers interesting contrast to the nip of mustard, vinegar, Tabasco and Worcestershire included in the sauce. The sauce is ready to be used as soon as the ingredients are blended.

Barbecued Spareribs

3 pounds spareribs 3 tablespoons vinegar
 4 tablespoons unsulphured 2 tablespoons Worcestershire
 molasses sauce
 4 tablespoons prepared mustard 2 teaspoons Tabasco

Have spareribs cut in serving pieces. Place in shallow baking pan. Combine unsulphured molasses and mustard; stir in remaining ingredients. Brush spareribs with part of sauce. Bake in a moderate oven, (350° F.) 1½ hours, brushing frequently with remaining sauce. Serve with "Glazed Apple Rings." YIELD: 6 servings.

"Glazed Apple Rings"

4 medium red apples 3 tablespoons unsulphured molasses
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine

Core apples; cut in approximately ¼ inch slices. Heat unsulphured molasses and butter in skillet; add apple slices. Turn to cover with butter-molasses mixture. Simmer gently 10 minutes, turning and basting occasionally.

Supermarket Trend In Food Industry Of America Noted

Automation of the food industry is progressing rapidly as grocery stores grow bigger, more ready-prepared foods are processed and the selection of food items increases, an Oregon State college extension specialist reports. In reviewing U. S. department

of agriculture reports about the growth of retail foods stores, Zelma Reigle, OSC food marketing specialist, tells how Oregon shoppers are sharing in the national pattern.

Today's stores, she says, carry about 5000 to 7000 different items. These include everything from toiletries, packaged dinners and toys to housewares, music, magazines and potted plants.

To meet shoppers' wants, grocery stores have become "supermarkets." The number of big stores—those with sales over a million dollars a year—more than tripled in the U. S. in the six years between 1948 and 1954.

In grandmother's day, marketing was a system for selling food and fiber, Miss Reigle continues. Today, services are important items of trade. Shoppers are buying more partially or fully prepared foods and ready-made textile products to save time and effort of home preparation. Commercially prepared biscuit

and cake mixes, ready-to-cook poultry, prepackaged vegetables that need no cleaning and trimming before cooking, frozen French fried potatoes, frozen meat pies and other speciality foods represent work that is being done by marketing agencies instead of homemakers, she said.

Population, another factor that has influenced the size of markets, is increasing at about 2½ to 3 million persons a year. Suburban living is attracting shopping centers at the edge of towns where parking areas are more accessible.

Food shoppers apparently like the time-saving conveniences of processed, packaged and convenience foods because they are willing to pay extra money for them, Miss Reigle points out. Shoppers are spending about two-thirds of a billion dollars more for farm-produced foods today than they spent in 1954. And the experts say the increase is going mainly for marketing services.
