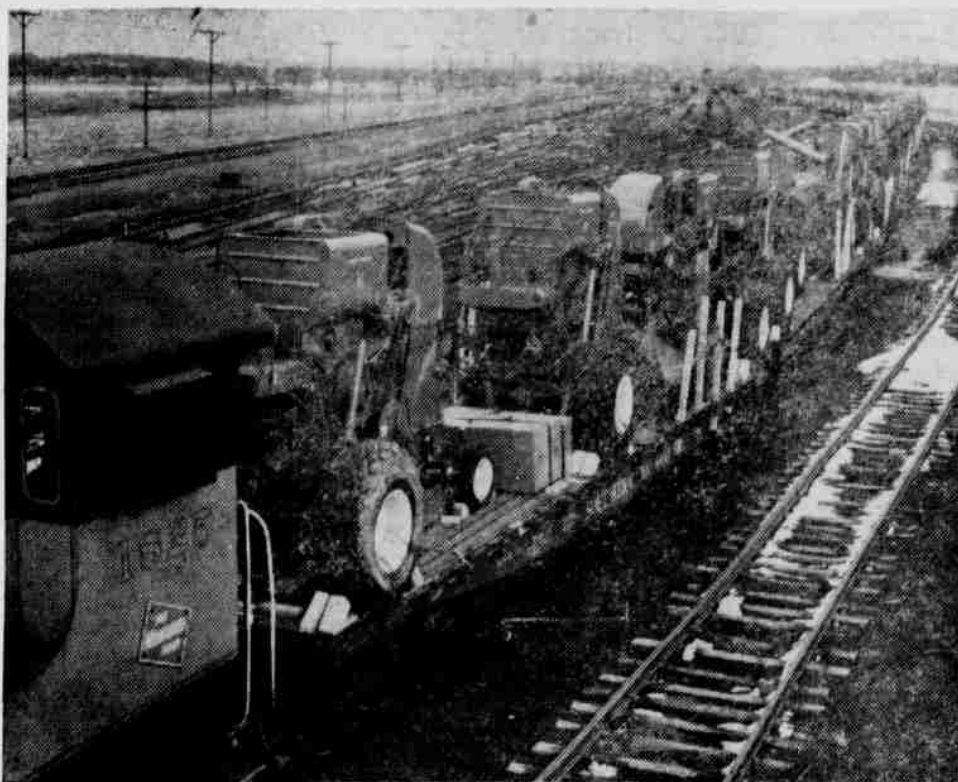
Willard Baker returned home the first of the week from Fort Lee, Va., where he has been the past three months attending school in connection with his work at Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

Mr. and Mrs. Larry Fletcher and family of Yakima were visitors at the O. W. Cutsforth ranch on Tuesday.

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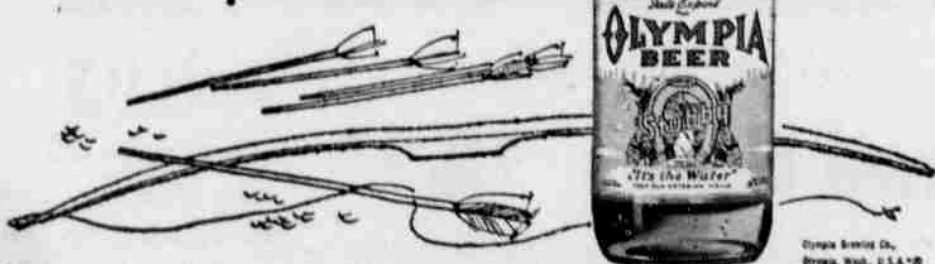
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
