Bank Debits Show Climb in Area

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Bank debits for March for the Pendleton area showed an increase of 18.9 per cent over February of this year, and an increase also of 16.6 over March of last year. Total bank debits for the area were \$26,406,572 with eight banks reporting.

Bank debits for the entire state, totalling \$1,588,612,459 with 165 banks reporting, indicated a rise of 12.1 per cent from February 1957 and also a gain of 5.1 per cent over March a year ago.

Bank debits, regarded as good indicators of business activity, represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and business firms. The Bureau of Municipal Research collects bank debits monthly.

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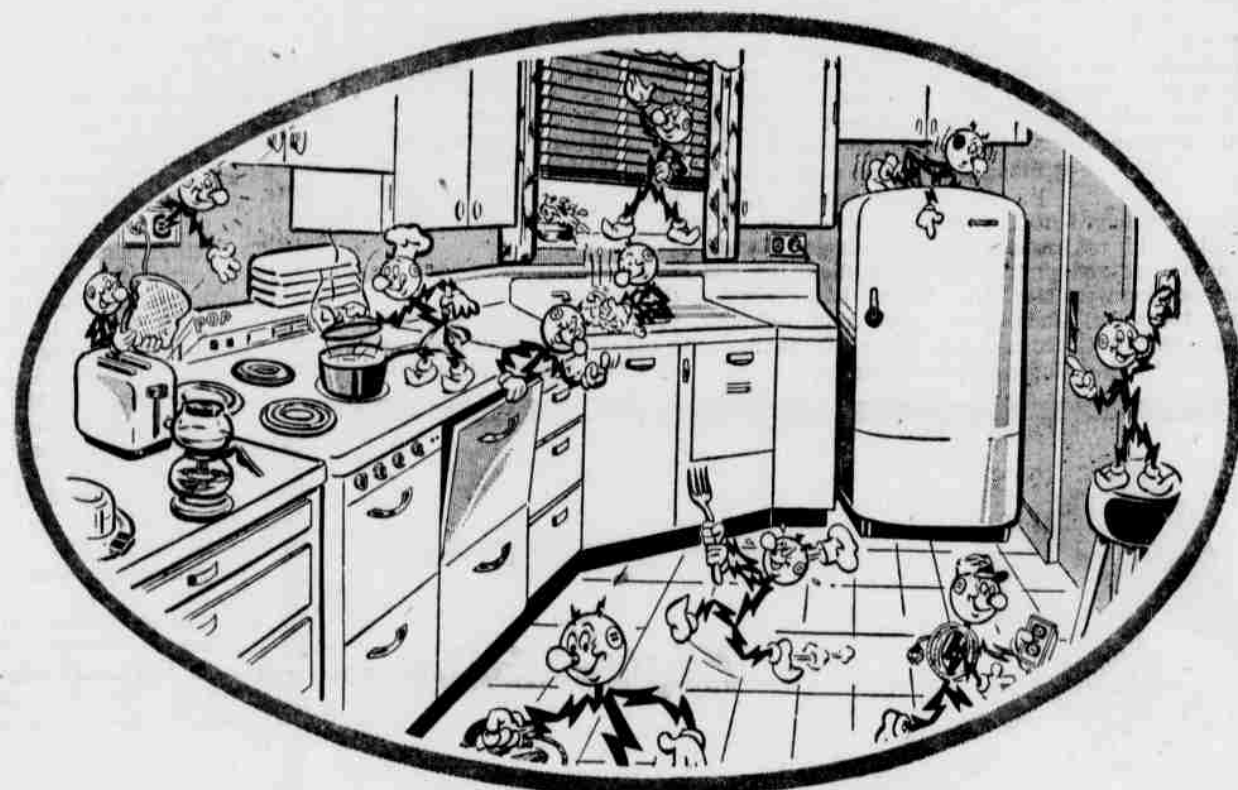
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
