Holders of certificates are authorized to teach lifesaving and to act as lifeguards under Red Cross national standards.

This will be a feature of a playday for high school juniors and seniors, to be given by the Marylhurst Recreational association on campus. Livestock Prices Take Slight Dip

HERMISTON—Prices tailed off slightly at the Hermiston Livestock Commission Co. sale Friday where 95 consignors placed 312 cattle, 187 hogs and 11 horses on the auction block.

While hog prices were steady, cattle marks dropped correspondingly with quality of animals but were still just below the record marks of the past two months.

Bulls, ranging from \$15.20 cwt. to \$17.90 cwt, showed the best gain from last week's spread of \$15.10 cwt. to \$16.90 cwt. Top fed steers went for \$22 cwt, a slight gain over last week's top of \$21.60 cwt, while heifer calves, veal, dairy cows, canner-cutter cows and utility-commercial cows all showed small drops. Steer calves were steady.

Manager Delbert Anson announced that at next Friday's sale a strong demand of Holstein and Guernsey cows will be dispersed, with plenty of dairy cows needed. Also on the wanted list are better quality calves and cows.

Removing Infested, Weak Pine Trees Cuts Beetle Damage

Tree farmers in the ponderosa pine country of Eastern Oregon can do much to reduce damage by bark beetles, pests that have killed about as much timber as fire in past years, reports Charles Ross, Oregon State college farm forestry specialist.

Selection removal of weak and infested trees is the best means found so far to protect ponderosa pine from large scale attack by the western pine beetle, according to a recent research report from the forest service.

Ross says this method of logging, known in foresters' language as sanitation-salvage cutting has been practiced in recent times by progressive pine tree farmers as well as public agencies.

Identification of trees susceptible to beetle attack is an established part of pine marking for logging and sale timber on these managed forest lands. Long experience has shown that susceptible trees are the slow growers—crowded, intermediate or suppressed trees, older and over-mature trees, and trees lacking normal vigor.

Short needles, drying twigs, declining vigor at the top, and poor color are among other signs of poor health, says the specialist, that mark a tree as susceptible to attack by the western pine beetle. Also, the older the timber, the greater the losses that may occur.

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
