## Soroptimists Install New Officers at Saturday Banquet

Two district officers and one federation committee chairman were present for the tenth annual installation banquet of Soroptimist International of Heppner at the Episcopal parish house, Saturday evening, June 9th.

Miss Virginia Welch, district director, district No. 2, Northwest Region of Soroptimist clubs, presided at the installation of the 1957-58 officers for the local group.

Miss Welch was one of the five outstanding Oregon women elected by the Portland Alumna chapter of the Journalism Society Theta Sigma Phi as women of achievement to whom tribute was paid at the Matrixible banquet in April. She was singled out for her outstanding achievements in the field of hospital administration. She is a registered nurse who has become administrator of Good Samaritan

hospital in Corvallis. She has not only held the position usually taken by a man, but has been able to raise funds to expand and modernize the hospital since she took the post in 1951. She is the second woman president of the Oregon Hospital Association and is currently serving as a member of the Oregon board of nurse examiners. In 1954 she was chosen citizen of the year by the Beilton County Chamber of Commerce for service beyond the call of duty to hundreds of people in that area.

Miss Welch was assisted in the installation by Miss Bernadine Batters of Vancouver, Washington who also gave the response to Mayor W. C. Collins's welcome. Miss Batters is chairman of the committee on classification and membership for the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs and a member of the Federation nominating committee. She is director of educational supplies for the Vancouver public schools.
