WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Washington observers know heaviest domestic pressure for foreign give-away programs comes jointly from socialists and some influential big business leaders.

Socialists' viewpoint is understood. Not so fully understood is how some big business firms

cash in on foreign aid. So many in Washington were keenly interested in recent report on a dairy operation as printed in national business publication.

Nine years C. W. Harder ago a firm called International Dairy Supply was formed. Almost immediately brand new firm got Defense Dept. contract to supply milk to armed forces.

This firm then merged with Foremost Dairies, who has since completed mergers with some of nation's biggest dairy operations. But according to the published report, military business is still bulk of corporation's business, estimated to be somewhere around half billion dollars per year.

In many parts of U. S. consumers pay high fixed price for milk, while there are dairy farmers who claim they do not receive fair share of what consumer must pay. Foremost operates in some of these areas.

In addition, Foremost is doing a bit of milk business in Free Asia, shipping into the area dry milk solids and condensed but-ter that when combined with water produces a palatable milk.

Government, through Agriculture Dept., is supplying Foremost with ingredients for a little more than half the value of those ingredients.

And it also seems but logically obvious that here is one huge combine that is all in favor of big foreign aid programs. It is not illogical to assume it is in there pitching for more of the same. And bearing in mind that one of the parts of this combine, International Dairy Supply, could, when newly formed, share the Defense Dept. contract when there were much, much longer established firms in the business, gives logical ground to an assumption that the firm must have considerable influence in official circles.

It perhaps could be said this is quite a milking operation.

But contrasted to the high sounding aim is report that in Hong Kong, Thailand, other places, company gets around 40 cents per quart for product. Forty cents is about day's wages in area. In Japan, where wage rates are around 8 cents per hour, price is 24 cents per quart.

In addition, government is giving away thousands of dollars of Foremost milk to natives to help them acquire taste for product. Nothing is said as to eventual consequences if all Asians become milk addicts and they cannot get the 40 cents for a daily quart.

Altogether, it was quite a story, especially when born in mind, it is alleged in this published report, this one firm has almost exclusive contract to supply armed forces, thus shutting out independent dairies near defense installations.

OSG Gets New Lead In 'White Muscle' Disease Research
New evidence that scientists are closing in on "white muscle" disease—widespread killer of calves and lambs—is reported by the Oregon State college agricultural experiment station. OSC researchers recently pro-

duced the disease experimentally in lambs whose dams received a predominant diet of Ladino clover during the last two months of pregnancy. Research workers were J. E. Oldfield, animal husbandman; O. H. Muth, veterinarian; and J. R. Schubert, agricultural chemist.

Last year, the scientists produced seven "white muscle" calves by feeding pregnant cows an all-alfalfa ration. The disease causes deterioration of heart and other muscle tissue in lambs and calves.

Findings are not a blanket indictment of feeding legume hays during late pregnancy. Oldfield emphasized. They do give some good leads for combating the disease that has bagged science for a quarter of a century and costs the livestock industry millions of dollars annually. Some Oregon ranchers have reported losing more than half their lamb

or calf crop in recent years—in a few cases being forced out of business.

Death from recorded cases of white muscle heart has varied in time from birth to three months. Attacks in skeletal muscles cause "stiff" lambs and calves which sometimes die through inability to nurse.

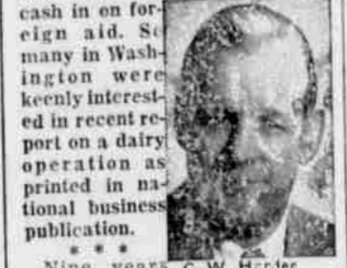
Since white muscle disease appears to occur more frequently in some areas of Oregon than others, the researchers will attempt to link it to certain chemical compounds in feeds related to crop growing conditions.

Analysis of muscle tissue from afflicted calves showed that white muscle contained twice as much mineral as muscle from normal animals. Calcium was 20 times greater than normal and phosphorus was twice normal.

In the latest OSC trials, white muscle showed up within six weeks of birth in all lambs from 22 ewes fed Ladino clover chaff or Ladino chaff and oats for the last two months of pregnancy.

Meanwhile, the scientists offer some tentative suggestions for stockmen who have had trouble with the disease. Avoid feeding hays linked with white muscle during late pregnancy or diversify the feed by supplementing it with protein concentrate or giving animals access to range, they say.

In areas of Oregon where white muscle is a serious problem, ranchers might shift the breeding program for fall calving, the research team suggests.
