Mrs. Floyd Adams, vice president, presided in the absence of President Miss Leta Humphreys.

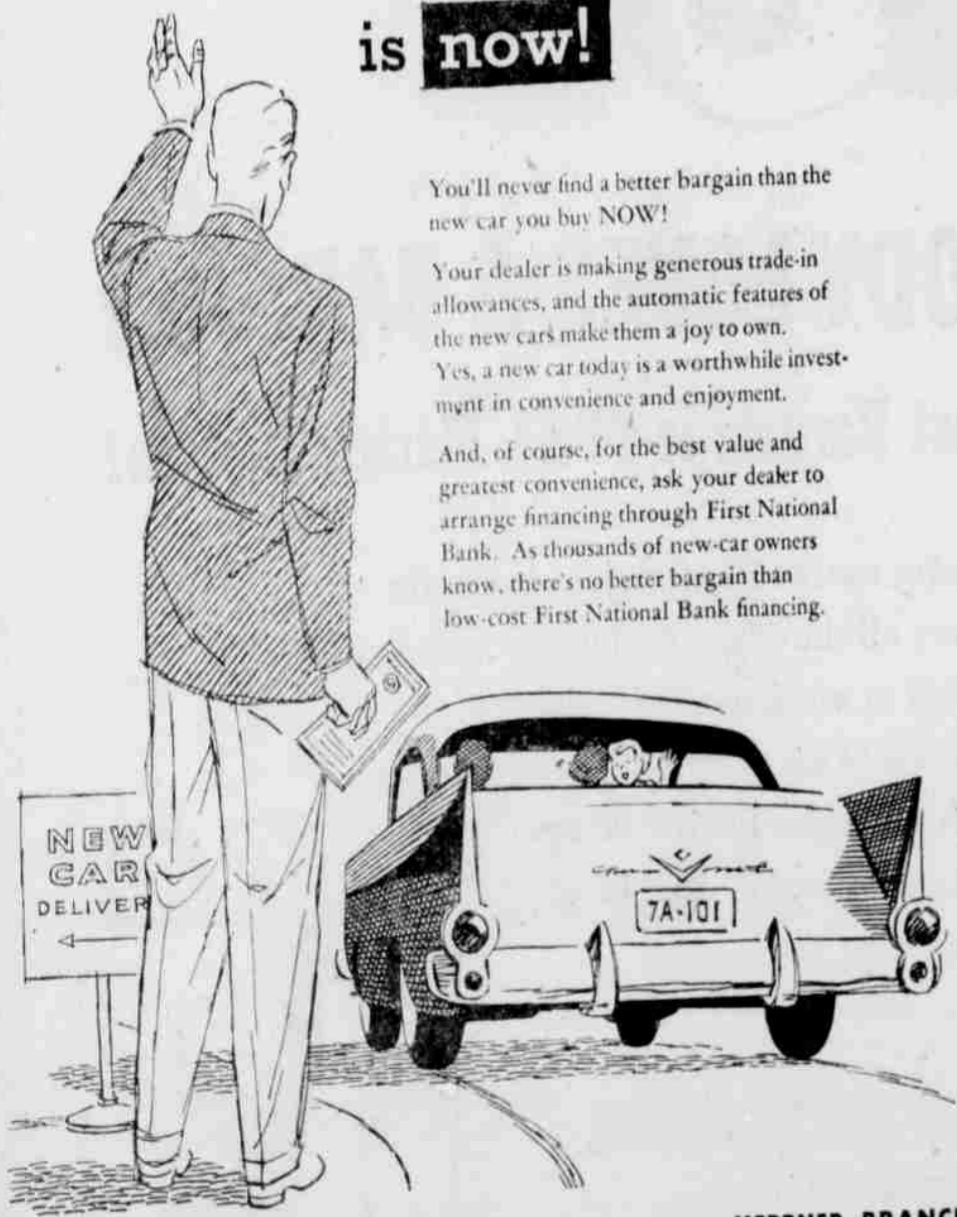
Committee reports were given with the new committee chairmen taking over the duties for the coming club year.
