

Top 4-H Hereford Brings \$1 Pound At Auction Sale

Kenneth Nelson of Lexington showed the grand champion 4-H beef at the fair and his animal brought him \$1.00 per pound at the 4-H and FFA auction sale Thursday night. It was a 965 lb. prime Hereford and was purchased by the Morrow County Grain Growers.

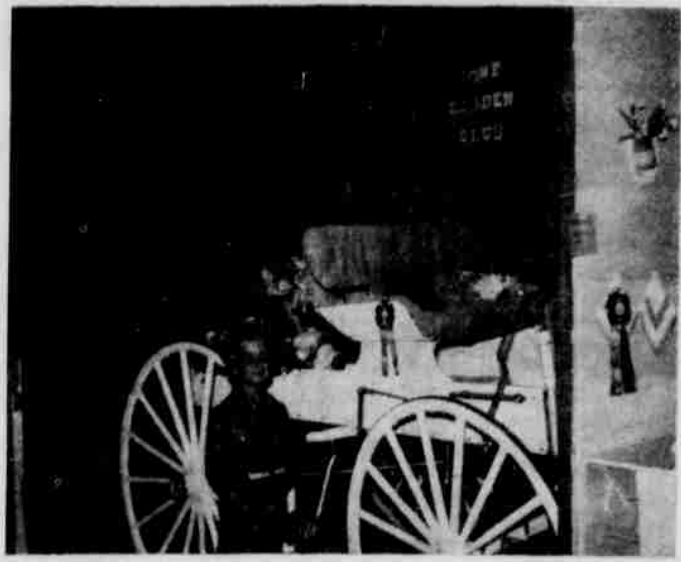
Reserve champion, a 1045 lb. Hereford steer shown by Connie Anderson, Heppner, sold for 80 cents a pound to the Heppner Pine Mills for \$836. Grand champion sheep, a Southdown cross weighing 100 pounds was sold by Karl Beach, Lexington to Heppner Pine Mills for 50 cents a pound and the Southdown shown by Rolfe Ekstrom, Ione, was sold for 35 cents a pound to the Pendleton Grain Growers. Jerry Anderson, Heppner, showed the grand champion pig, a 161 pound cross bred sold for 45 cents a pound to Farley Motor Co. David Anderson, Heppner, showed the reserve champion, a 152 pound cross bred which sold to Alex Lindsay, Lexington, at 45 cents.

The Morrow county 4-H council gained \$164.51 from two donated sheep at the sale. A total of \$59.75 was realized from a sheep donated by Kenneth Nelson sold to the N. C. Anderson family, turned in for resale and sold to Barney Doherty, Lexington. Ruggles Insurance company donated a sheep at the sale which in turn sold to Harold Wright, John Graves, Northwestern Livestock company and finally taken by Pendleton Grain Growers, Pendleton for a total profit of \$84.75.

Other fat steers sold for 10 cents above market price all going for 28 cents a pound. COUNTY WELFARE COSTS SHOW CLIMB OF 12 PERCENT IN 1956-57 YEAR

Morrow county public welfare commission expenses increased more than 12 percent over last year the commission's annual report shows. The increase brought to \$80,560.84 the total expenditures for the 1956-57 fiscal year which ended on July 1.

Old age assistance continued to require the largest portion of funds and expenditures for a total of \$47,500.10. Other expenditures by program included aid to the permanently and totally disabled \$5,978.42; general assistance, \$1,538; all supplemental care, \$12,565.36; and administration, \$9,883.96. Again this year no aid to the blind or foster care was used.

The break-down by source of funds showed \$13,174.28 county; \$37,852.65, state, and \$29,533.91, federal. Numerous budget adjustments were required because of the unpredictable 18 percent increase in expenditures for medical care.

An increase of \$1,612.11 in old age assistance payments over last year was due to increased requirements for nursing home care. Total supplemental medical

care costs were more than doubled over last year by an increase of \$6,297.19. Expenditures for supplemental medical care together with related medical costs totaled \$30,136.03 or 43 percent of the total assistance funds expended. This compares with about 25 percent of total expenditures for these purposes for each of the two preceding years.

Aid to the permanently and totally disabled increased \$263.42 and general assistance costs rose \$100.63 over last year. Aid to the dependent children showed the only decrease which amounted to \$255 for the year. Due to the purchase of a new state automobile administration costs increased \$1,758.88.

The number of cases receiving financial assistance decreased to approximately 64 per month from the average of 70 cases per month for both of the two preceding years. Exclusive of administrative expenses the average yearly cost per case increased \$194.92 to a total of \$1,104.33.

The average monthly caseload included slightly more than 51 old age assistance cases, between three and four aid to dependent children, between six and seven aid to permanently and totally disabled cases and almost three general assistance. The average number of persons receiving supplemental medical care was just over 23 each month. A total of 141 cases, including child welfare, social security, vocational rehabilitation and selective service matters, received services but not financial assistance.

Expenditures in the fiscal report showed old age assistance, \$47,500.10; medical, \$10,675.98; aid to dependent children, \$3,095.31; aid to permanently and totally disabled, \$5,978.42; medical, \$1,641.13; general assistance maintenance, \$1,538; medical \$217.25, and administration, \$9,883.96.

The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs has appointed Aaron J. "Jake" Brown as its district representative for 10 Eastern Oregon counties effective immediately. Brown replaces Charles W. Daum, who has been transferred to the department's headquarters in Salem.

Brucellosis Orders Affect Range Areas and P-D Dairy Herds

The state department of agriculture has designated 17 counties east of the Cascades as range or semi-range counties and areas under the new program for control of brucellosis tuberculosis and paratuberculosis. Testing procedures in these counties will follow the pattern established in the general regulations for this type of operation.

The counties are: Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Walla, Wasco and Wheeler.

Another order in connection with the accelerated brucellosis program requires that all producer-distributor (raw fluid milk) dairy herds continue under the same program they have followed. This means producer-distributor herds will be blood tested at least two times a year for brucellosis and tested annually for tuberculosis.

All other dairy herds will come under the testing requirements of the general brucellosis regulations which permits use of the milk ring test at the discretion of the department.
