

## Mustangs Lose Opener to Wallowa; Meet Fossil Friday

The Heppner Mustangs traveled to Wallowa Saturday, September 14 where they tangled with the Wallowa Cougars. Although the Mustangs came out on the bottom end of a 14-0 count in this opening game of the season, the playing was good to the very last minute.

Both teams played a strong defensive game. The Mustangs started by taking the kickoff but after a series of plays they were forced to punt. Wallowa took the punt but they too were forced to kick.

The game went scoreless well into the fourth quarter when Wallowa intercepted a Mustang pass on the Heppner 15 yard line and went all the way for the first score of the game. Late in the game the Cougars intercepted a second pass on their own 14 yard line. That stopped what could have been a scoring drive and opened up an 86 yard drive for the second touchdown for the Cougars. Both conversions for Wallowa were good bringing the score to 14-0.

By way of interesting statistics, Wallowa racked up 11 first downs to Heppner's 8, but Heppner made 283 yards to Wallowa's 213. Twice Heppner was within 10 yards of a score but could not break the Cougar defense.

Next Friday Heppner will travel to Fossil where they will play their first Cayuse Conference game with Wheeler County Union High. Game time is 2 p.m.

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## August 'E' Bond Sale High in Oregon

Sales of series E savings bonds in Oregon were higher in August than in any other month since January 1956, according to word received here today by Jack Bedford, county savings bonds committee chairman.

"Oregonians bought \$2,988,176 worth of these popular securities last month," said Bedford. "Total sales of E and H bonds amounted to \$3,732,632, highest since January. However, even this huge volume was off 13% compared to August, 1956, when H bond sales were the highest ever."

Savings bonds sales in this county last month were \$11,984. A year ago they were \$13,148.

International Letter Writing Week will be celebrated in Boardman during the week Oct. 6-12. Postmaster Flossie Coats announced today. Commenting on the establishment of International Letter Writing Week, Mrs. Coats pointed out that each year since 1938 the post office department has joined in the observance of National Letter Writing Week—an annual event celebrated to emphasize the meaning and value of letter writing as a symbol of American freedom.

## Farm Conservation Program Details To Be Set Sept. 24

Practices, specifications, and payment rates for the 1958 agricultural conservation program (ACP) in Oregon will be decided at a meeting of the state ACP group in Portland September 24, according to Robert T. Lister, chairman of the state agricultural stabilization and conservation (ASC) committee.

The state ASC committee has received the 1958 ACP program from Washington, Lister said, and is now ready for the ACP development group to select practices determine specifications, and set rates for Oregon within the limits of the national program.

Provisions of the 1958 national program differ only slightly from those now being carried out by Oregon farmers under the 1957 ACP, Lister reported. The state ASC committee has been authorized to offer cost-sharing on the same practices as in 1957—if the state ACP development group decides to include them in the 1958

Oregon program. After the state ACP program has been approved, county ACP development groups will select practices, specifications, and payment rates to meet local conservation needs in their particular counties.

The Oregon ACP development group includes the state ASC committee the state conservationist of the soil conservation service, a representative of the U. S. forest service, and representatives of the OSC school of agriculture. On the state ASC committee are Lister; J. R. Beck, assistant director of the Oregon State college extension service; and farmer members Joe McBurney, Hillsboro and Jens Terjeson, Pendleton.
