**Doubt if you've seen** the special maps this telephone man is looking at. It's a sure bet you won't find them in your youngsters' school books. But maps like this are mighty important to us. They show the routes of telephone lines here in town—above the streets and underground, too. If our instruments see a sign of trouble, these maps help repair crews track it down in a hurry. We plan ahead this way so we can fix troubles before they affect your service.

**Could be that you've noticed** cans like these hanging from telephone cables. If so, you've probably wondered about them. Well, they're weights to keep cables from "dancing" in the wind. Know how your clothesline gets whipped around on windy days? If we let this happen to telephone lines, it might loosen the poles. So these weights keep the wind from playing tricks on us.
