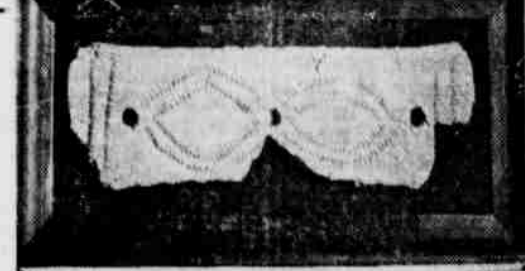

Can You Identify This Object?

CLUE: William Campbell, of the Oregon Territorial Volunteers, confiscated this historical item after an Indian battle in the Yakima Valley in 1856. The holes are for carrying purposes and the design served no useful function. ANSWE: It is a piece of Indian "bread" made of corn meal and carmel root. The use of corn meal in bread was introduced in the northwest by the white man although the eastern and southern Indians had known of its existence previously. An interesting parallel is the use by the Nez Perce Indians of corn husk as a decorative material in their soft, woven bags.
