He has ganged-up with Joe Dwyer, state Director of Agriculta reciprocal agreement for the prevention of livestock theft.

The agreement went into effect before the inked signatures were dry and provides that livestock cannot cross the state line without an official brand certificate from the state of origin.

Washington will hold any Oregon livestock arriving in their state without such official certificate, until Oregon officials authorize or request the release of proceeds from the sale of that livestock. If Washington officials believe the livestock is stolen, they will detain the animals until release has been granted by Ore-
