Party Bound Pineapple Dessert



Pineapple Caramel Charlotte is a conversation maker that marks any meal or party as a special occasion. But in spite of the elegant appearance and wonderful flavor, you'll be pleased at what an easy dessert it is to make.

It can be made in a mold or spring form pan to serve at the table. If you prefer to use a loaf or deep sided cake pan and serve it in slices or wedges the pineapple design goes on top.

Pineapple Caramel Charlotte

1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup cold milk
1/2 lb. vanilla caramels
1 cup canned pineapple juice

1/2 pint whipping cream
Lady fingers, or plain cake
1 can (9 oz.) sliced pineapple

Mix gelatin and milk in top of double boiler. Add caramels and cook over hot water until caramels are dissolved, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and add pineapple juice. Chill until the mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Fold in whipped cream. Stand lady fingers around sides of a mold and arrange drained cut pineapple slices in a design on bottom. Fill with caramel mixture and chill until firm. Six servings.

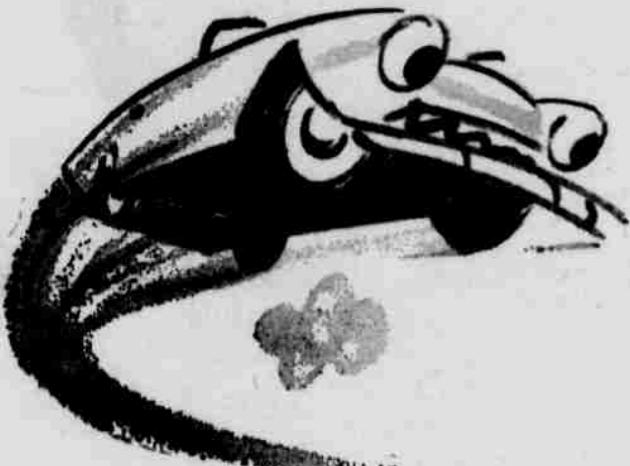

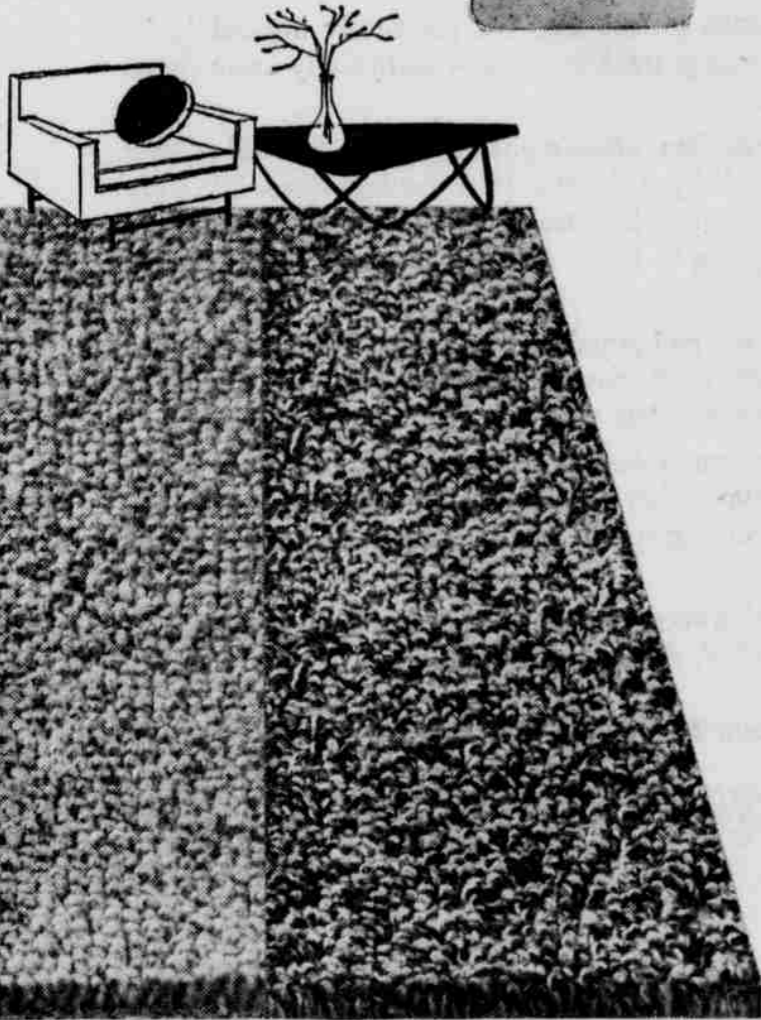
