

## Mustangs Divide Wins and Losses In Condon Play

Heppner high school's Mustangs continued their "splitting" ways over the weekend as they won one and dropped one in a pair of close contests. Both games were with non-league foes and were played at Condon.

Friday night the Mustangs tangled with Sisters in a close game that saw a single point decide the contest as the Outlaws won 38-37.

The Mustangs started the first quarter sloy as their offense could only gain four points while the Outlaws netted 10. Through their never-dying hustle the Mustangs closed the second stanza point gap to 22-19 by halftime.

After intermission both clubs played evenly in both quarters as the Horsemen drew to within one point of Sisters in the last few seconds. This was as close as they got as a last second scoring attempt by Heppner was foiled.

High point man for Heppner was Ruhl with 17. High for Sisters was Williams with 20.

Heppner's Mustangs avenged their Friday night defeat by Sisters Saturday by knocking off Culver's Bulldogs in a tightly played contest with a final result of 42-40.

The Mustangs jumped to a good start in the first quarter and by virtue of their defensive maneuvers were able to gray a 13-6 first panel lead. Again in the second period the Horsemen were red-hot on offense and defense and by half-time they had piled up a 22-15 advantage.

After intermission the Bulldogs came alive to take over the lead in the third period by 4 points, 38-28. In the stretch, however, the Mustangs "hung tight" and weathered the storm for the victory.

## Nazarenes to Observe 50th Anniversary

Looking forward to the 1958 golden anniversary year of the Church of the Nazarene, Dr. S. T. Ludwig, general church secretary, has outlined a series of simultaneous events in which every church of the denomination will participate.

Pastors of all local Nazarene churches now are planning for individual or union watch night services, December 31, which will usher in the jubilee year.

Other simultaneous services in Nazarene churches around the world will include:

Jan. 5—Worship service marking the start of the anniversary year; Apr. 6—Easter offering for world missions, goal, \$1,000,000; Oct. 12, 1958—50th anniversary Sunday services; and Nov. 23—Thanksgiving offering for world missions, goal \$1,000,000.

Official birth of the Church of the Nazarene was Oct. 13, 1908 at Pilot Point, Texas, when a group of smaller churches in the East, West and South formally united.

Sharing a belief in the Wesleyan doctrine of entire sanctification, or heart purity, the original 228 churches and 10,000 members have increased in 50 years to 4,500 churches with approximately 300,000 members.

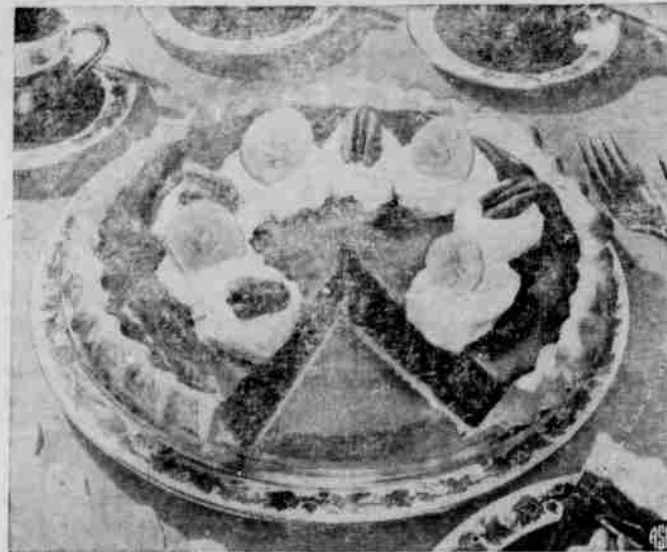
### Local Girls in Community Proram

### Mocha Cream Pie

- 2 tablespoons instant coffee
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1 baked 8-inch pie shell or graham cracker crumb crust

Combine pie filling mix, instant coffee, sugar, and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Whip cream, then fold into pudding. Pour into pie shell. Chill well before serving. Garnish with whipped cream puffs, banana slices and pecan halves.

## 787 Predators Caught In 27-Day Period

Federal-State hunters and trappers caught 787 predatory animals from October 20 through November 16, according to statistics released by Mel Smith, district agent for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and M. E. Knickerbocker, animal division chief for the Oregon department of agriculture.

Again, more coyotes were caught than any other predator, Knickerbocker stated. Besides 289 coyotes, hunters trapped 120 bobcats, 112 porcupines, 98 racoons, 62 badgers, 51 skunks, 42 foxes, 11 bears and two opossums.

Malheur county hunters reported killing 45 coyotes to lead the rest of the state in destruction of that animal. Eight of the 11 bears were taken in Curry county, and 22 bobcats were reported destroyed in Harney county. Marion and Lane county hunters tied for the highest total of foxes—14 each.

Josephine county hunters reported 25 skunks and 16 racoons caught within their boundaries to lead the state in totals for those two predators. Baker, Wheeler and Columbia counties also claimed state highs with 19 badgers, 14 porcupines and two opossums, respectively.
