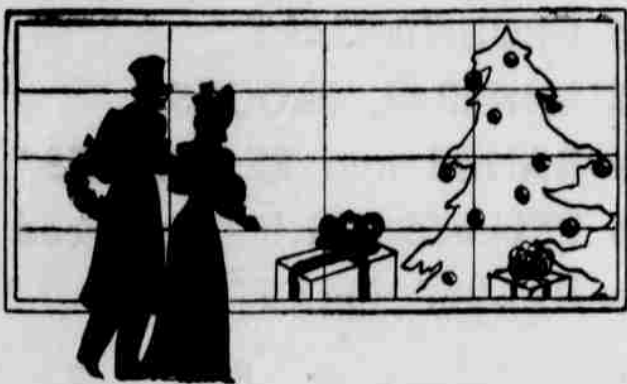

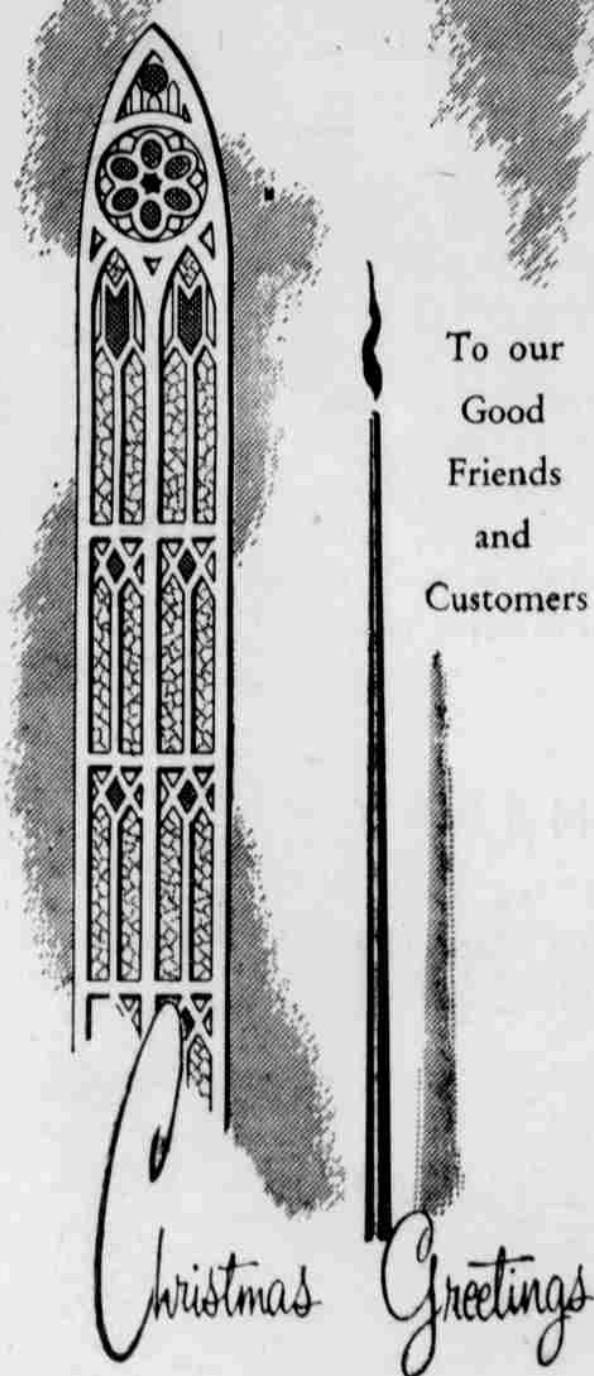

What's Your Safety Quotient?



For safe driving, make it a family rule that children are not permitted to distract the driver.

Here's a checklist of driving do's and don'ts for harassed and harried mothers who have to make so many extra "last minute" shopping trips during the holidays.

Remember, while such devices as nylon safety belts, dashboards cushioned with urethane foam, and laminated safety glass windows minimize injuries when accidents occur, they do not prevent collisions from taking place. It is also important to keep windshield wipers in good operating condition at all times, and glass areas clear of snow, sleet, and dirt.

Observe these 14 rules prepared by the National Safety Council, and your SQ* will put you at the head of the class:

1. Never leave children alone in the car, regardless of whether or not the motor is left running.
2. Have youngsters ride in back seat whenever possible.
3. Allow no eating of lollipops or ice cream on sticks in moving car.
4. Permit no rough-housing, friendly or otherwise.
5. Have family rule that children are not permitted to distract driver (remember, always pull over to the curb and stop car if it becomes necessary to admonish children).
6. All riders must be seated while auto is moving.
7. Hands, heads, and possessions must remain inside the car at all times.
8. All doors locked when vehicle is in motion.
9. No sharp-edged, hard or heavy toys permitted which might become lethal flying missiles in case of sudden stops.
10. No objects stowed at any time on window deck behind rear seat.
11. Infants firmly strapped in car bed or halter type safety seat belt at all times.
12. Driver should be physically fit. Don't drive when tired or high-strung. Car should be mechanically safe also.
13. Children in back should not be sitting in drafts. Crack side vents to provide necessary ventilation, prevent exposures leading to colds or infections.
14. Always remember to be alert to the actions of drivers of other cars. They may not be as careful about their driving habits as you are.

Seed Certification Acreage Shows Gain For 1957 in Oregon

Oregon farmers entered more than 85,000 acres for seed certification at Oregon State college during 1957—the largest acreage in the past 10 years and 8,000 acres more than in 1956, according to Harold E. Finnell, OSC seed certification specialist.

Twenty-seven grass varieties were certified for a total of nearly 62,000 acres, an increase of 2,000 acres over last year. Perennial ryegrass topped the list with 33,000 acres although it was down 2,000 acres from 1956. Highland bentgrass was second with more than 12,000 acres, an increase of 2,600 acres over last year.

Other varieties with more than 1,000 acres were Alta fescue, Merion bluegrass, Astoria bentgrass, and Seaside bentgrass. All red fescue grass varieties showed decreases from last year.

Dixie crimson clover with more than 4,000 acres headed the list of seven clover varieties inspected for a combined acreage of 10,727. Kenland red clover was second with nearly 2,500 acres—down 700 acres from 1956. Pennscott red clover with nearly 2,000 acres certified showed a marked increase over last year.

Alfalfa certification gained 800 acres over 1956 with nine varieties totaling 8,400 acres. Ranger topped the list with 2,295 acres followed by Vernal and Talent with 890 and 516 acres, respectively.

Grain certification acreage almost doubled last year's figures, Finnell reported, with 26 cereal varieties totaling 4,710 acres. Two new wheat varieties, Burt and Omar developed by regional researchers for the Columbia Basin, were chiefly responsible for the increase.

Seed potato acreage decreased slightly with 3,235 acres passing field inspection. Netted Gem White Rose and Kennebec led the 12 varieties.

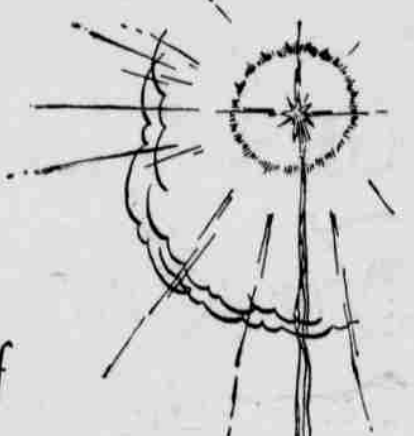

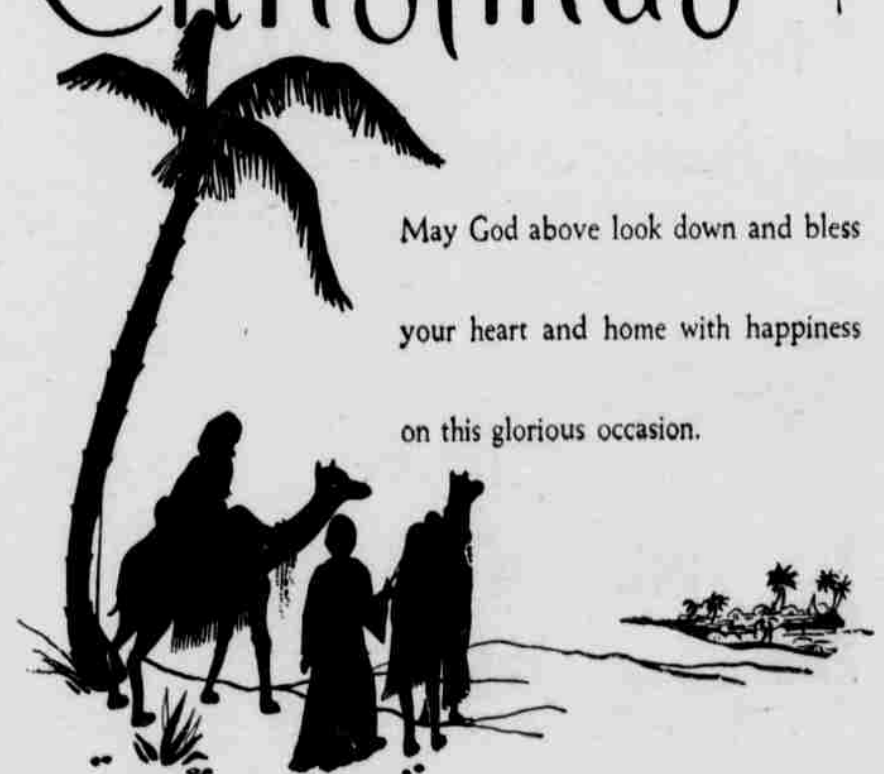
