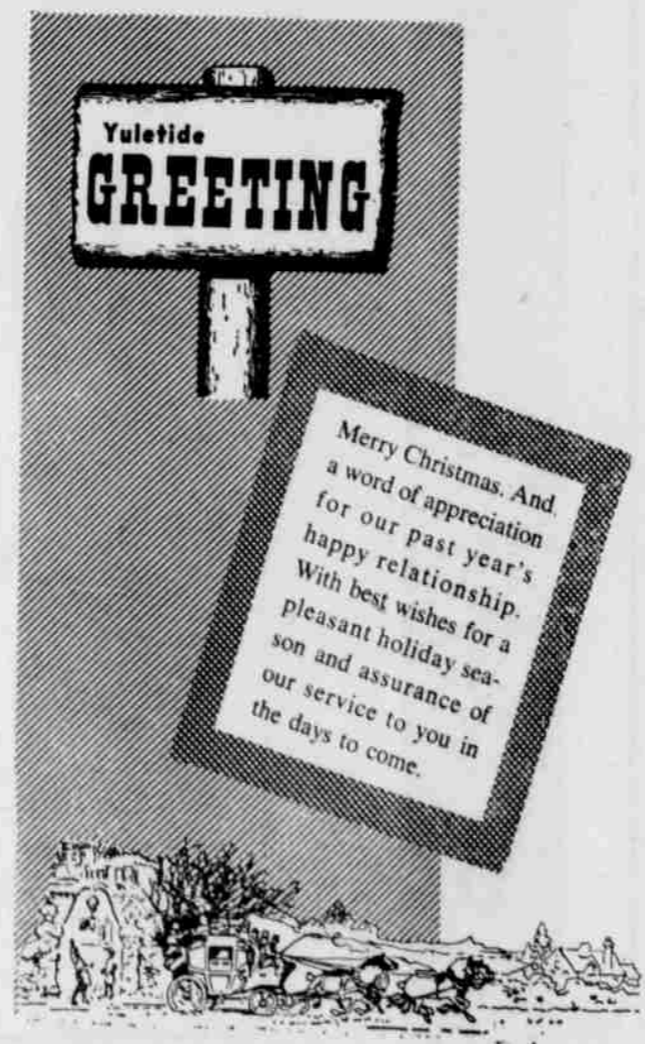
Soup—Salad Medley

Fruit And Pimiento-Cheese Salad

1/4 lb. sharp cheddar cheese 2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 can (4 oz.) pimientos 1 can (16 oz.) pear halves
1/4 cup mayonnaise 1 can (16 oz.) sliced peaches
1/4 teaspoon salt Salad greens
Mix grated cheese, drained chopped pimientos, mayonnaise, salt and lemon juice. Arrange a mound of the cheese mixture, chilled drained pear halves and peach slices on salad greens on individual salad plates. Four servings.

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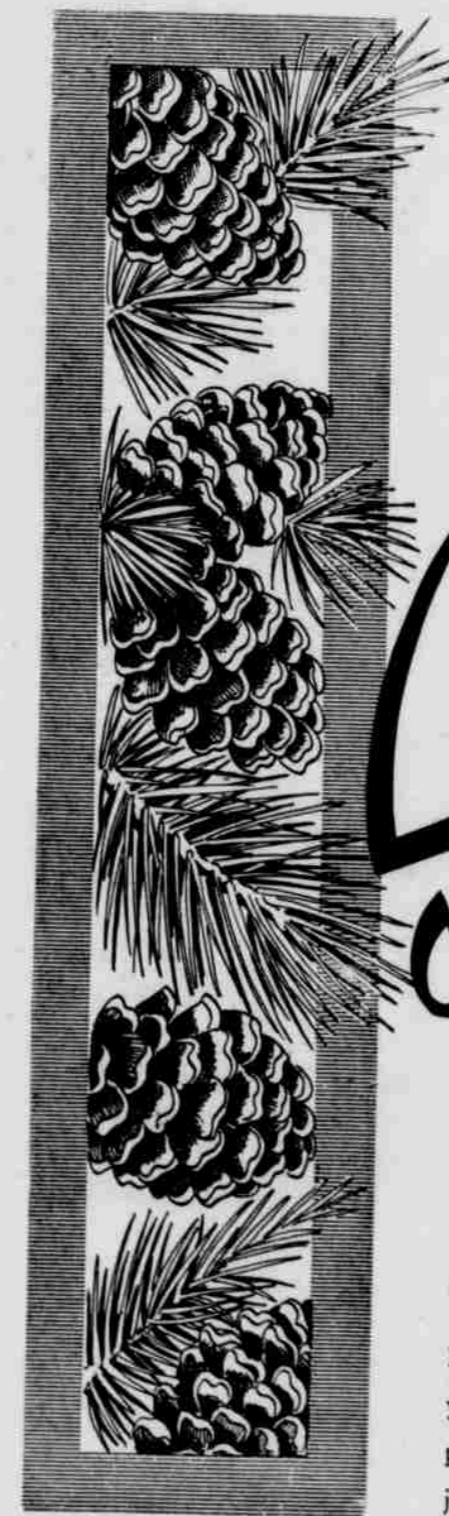
