Fifty Year Masonic Pin Presented To Frank S Parker At District Meeting

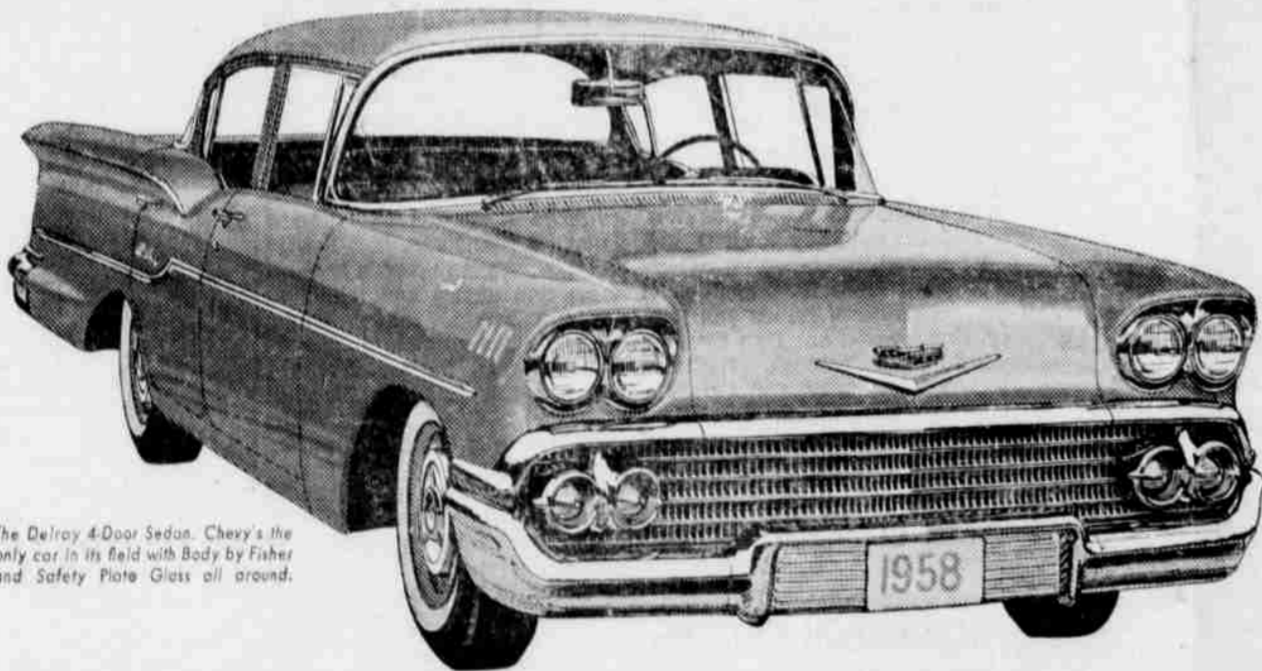
