Identify This Coin and Its Significance

CLUE: In 1845, among the clusters of log cabins on the banks of the Willamette, two men who had come West from Maine and Massachusetts used this coin to determine the fate of old Stumptown.

ANSWER: This is the "Portland Penny." The "Portland Penny" was the coin tossed by Pettigrove and Lovejoy to decide upon a new name for "Stumptown." Pettigrove wanted it named after Boston, Maine, and Lovejoy wanted it named after Portland, Massachusetts. Pettigrove won the toss, thus the name "Portland Penny."

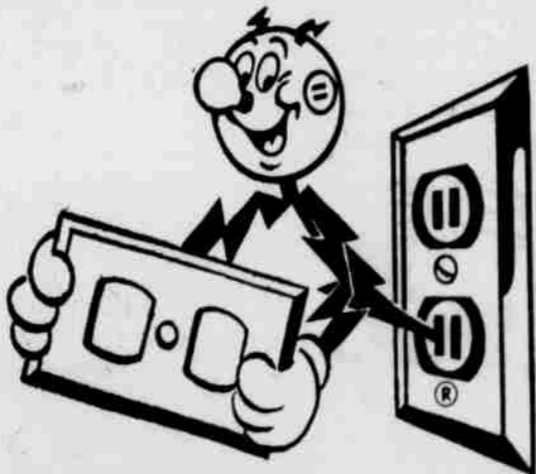

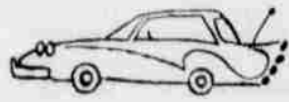
