It is your loss as well as the club's if you do not come the third Saturday of each month. See you later?

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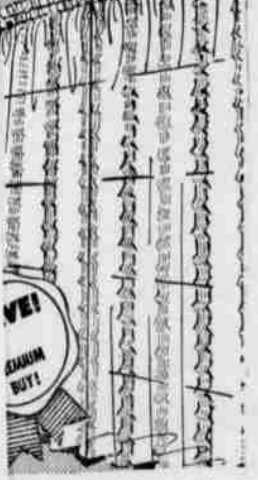
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
