Stanley Boyer and Elzy Emery were on business in John Day Friday.

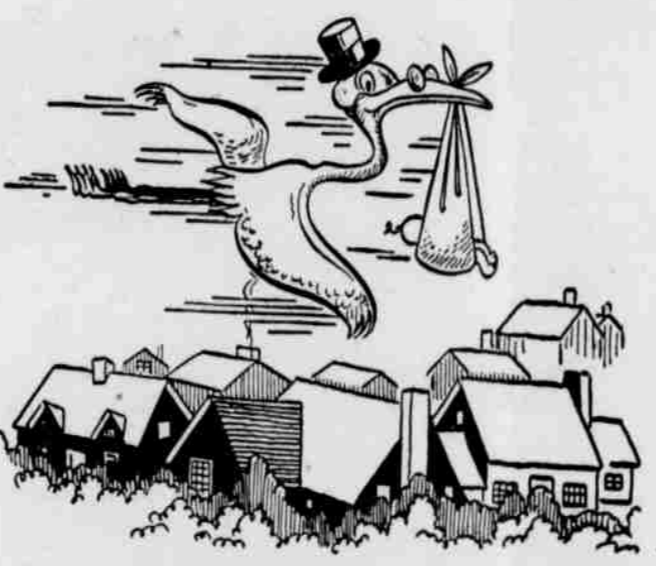
