Log Grades Studied In Eastern Oregon; Findings Published

Results of a cooperative study of lumber values from Douglas fir, western larch, and white fir in Eastern Oregon are available at the Oregon Forest Products Research center, Corvallis.

Log grades have been needed to indicate potential value of lumber from high priced stumpage. A series of studies have been planned by agencies concerned with sale or purchase of trees associated with ponderosa pine, the predominant species.

Cooperators in the first study were bureau of Indian affairs, bureau of land management, Forest Products Research center Pacific Northwest forest and range experiment station, U S forest service region 6, and Western Pine association.

Logs sawed by Mt Emily Lumber company at Enterprise were measured to learn the value of lumber from them. Board footage of lumber in various grades was tallied for each log.

From average lumber values found, trial log grades were written to help guide pricing of timber.

Since individual trees from different areas vary greatly in quality, additional studies in other locations are planned. A study in Baker county will be reported soon.
