**Keenan Named East Oregon District Manager for PP&L**

Pacific Power & Light Company announced Thursday the formation of a new division grouping the company's service districts in Oregon east of the Cascade mountains and the appointment of Thomas M Keenan, now district manager at Pendleton, as an assistant general manager with responsibility for the division.

"Grouping of the five districts of eastern and central Oregon into a new division reflects the growth of this important area of Oregon and the communities which are served by Pacific Power," George Bragg, vice president and general manager for PP&L, reported.

Keenan will continue to make his headquarters in Pendleton, Bragg said.

Succeeding Keenan as manager for the Pendleton district will be Eldon Drennan, now the local manager for PP&L at Prineville. "Both Keenan and Drennan have had wide experience in the electrical service industry," Bragg reported, "and are well qualified for the greater responsibilities of their new positions."

A veteran Pacific Power employee, Keenan has been manager of the Pendleton district since August 1953. His new area of responsibility will include the service districts of Pendleton, Enterprise, The Dalles, Hood River and the Central Oregon districts, the latter embracing Madras, Prineville, Redmond and Bend.

Keenan started with Pacific in 1922 as a lineman. He was Pendleton district line superintendent for many years and subsequently was transferred to Toppish, Wash., and then to Dayton, Wash., where he became district manager in 1944. There then followed a series of promotions to Yakima, Portland and Walla Walla. Prior to coming to Pendleton as district manager in 1953, he was a member of the general staff group located in the Yakima office.

While manager here, Keenan has been active in civic and service groups. He is the chairman of the Economic Development Committee, of the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce, a director of both the chamber and the United Fund, and is the immediate past president of Rotary club.

The new Pendleton district manager has been the manager for the company at Prineville since 1954, and previously was the Central Oregon district engineer. He is a graduate of Washington State college with a degree in electrical engineering.
