County Agent News (Continued from page 2) ion for the year can do so by contacting Raymond French, chairman of the membership and finance committee or by calling at this office.

Burton Peck, rancher in the Lexington community is well pleased with the well which he recently drilled at his ranch. In test pumping, the well yielded approximately a hundred gallons per minute. While the equipment was not readily available for testing the pump for greater capacity, it was thought that considerable more water could be pumped from it.

At this time of year, there are frequent inquiries at this office on seedbed preparation, rates of seeding and kinds of grasses and legumes best suited to the various soil and rainfall conditions in Morrow county. One of the frequent questions is in regards to the inoculation of legume seeds. Legumes build up the soil. They restore organic matter in nitrogen to the soil, taking this nitrogen from the air. Inoculation causes nodules to grow on the roots of the legumes. These nodules are the nitrogen factories of the plant, enabling the plant to take nitrogen from the air. By taking nitrogen from the air, the crop yield is increased at no expense to the soil, the

quality of the crop is improved due to higher protein content, and the soil is enriched for the betterment of crops to follow. The inoculation consists of bacteria which causes nodules to quickly grow, enabling the plant to begin taking nitrogen from the air early in its life. The inoculation process is simple and easy to follow and inoculant bacteria is available at 11 seed stores. It does not pay to risk crop failure by neglecting to inoculate legume seeds. Full directions on inoculating seed is printed on the label of every inoculant can.

Each year questions come to this office concerning seed certification standards, how certification is carried out and miscellaneous other questions pertaining to this program. In order that our people can be better informed on the seed certification program we will attempt over the next few weeks to outline some of these which we hope will be helpful to those interested.

The real purpose of seed certification in Oregon is to insure varietal identity and genetic purity. Only those varieties that contain superior germ plasm are eligible for certification. Certified seed is high in varietal purity and of good seeding value.

Varieties eligible for certification may have been in use many years, or they may have been produced recently through plant breeding. In either case, there is grave danger of their loss through handling without a planned method of production that is consistently carried forward. Seed certification is such a plan.

Varietal purity is the first consideration in seed certification. Other factors, such as weed and disease control, high viability, cleaning and grading, are also important. The use of seed con-

taining few weeds is one method to prevent wider distribution of weeds. Seed-borne diseases that may prevent the proper development of the plant during germination, vegetable growth, or seed formation periods are frequently distributed by seeds.

Seed certification is designed, therefore, to maintain not only genetic purity of superior crop varieties, but also reasonable standards of seed condition.

This program is conducted in Oregon under law by Oregon State College. The various phases of the seed certification program are directed by the Oregon State College extension service. Oregon county agents are the certification authorities in their respective counties. Rules, regulations, and other information on this subject are available to any grower by contacting the Morrow county agent's office.

The agent will attend a district extension conference at Pendleton on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. The first days session will be held at the Pen-

dleton branch experiment station where reports of wheat variety research, weed control and grain, and a review of conservation practices will be on the days program. The second days session will include a report to the Columbia Basin's soil fertility research, discussion on the establishment and use of result demonstrations and round-table discussions on county planning conference follow-up work.
