ALLSTOTTS CELEBRATE 60TH ANNIVERSARY IN HERMISTON

Mr and Mrs R E Allstott observed their 60th wedding anniversary, Sunday March 23. At the C R C in Hermiston, there were 350 friends and relatives present from various parts of the country.

The brides table with lace cloth was centered with a four tiered wedding cake topped with a miniature bride and groom. Yellow daffodils and other decorated the tables. The cake was baked and decorated by Mrs Gladys Ulmer. After the honored couple cut the first piece of the cake, coffee and punch were then served by the granddaughters.

Robert E Allstott and Mary E Ardwell were married at Beef Creek, Indian territory in Oklahoma in 1898. After a short wedding trip they traveled to Portland by horse and buggy and settled on a cattle ranch. They moved west in 1903 with three children, Dollie, Robert Jr. and Betty, and settled in the Eight-mile district about 23 miles from Hermiston on the John Allstott ranch.

Throughout the years they have been active in religious, social and school activities. . . . At one time Mr Allstott was a stock holder and promoter of the Jordan siding grain elevator, and hauled grain by wagon and team as the custom in those days. He can remember when ranchers for miles around hauled water by wagon from a spring on his ranch.

They recall the religious camp meetings held in the Willow Grove, children's day programs and Easter services which eased the toils of the day. Baptismal services were held in the nearby creek, they recall.

At one time Mr Allstott was chairman of the Rocky Bluffs school board and Mrs Allstott was active in the library meetings of the day and supplied large amounts of food for school activities.

By the time eight more children were born, Sue, Otis, Gladys, Tressie, Mary, Jane, Doris and Don, they were forced to sell their old Model T Ford and buy a Hudson Super Six a "super" occasion in those early 1900s.

In 1920 they bought the Henry Guy ranch on Rhea Creek where they did extensive stock and dairy farming.

In 1935, the family, now only three children at home, moved to the Pat Sullivan farm near Hermiston which they bought. During the building of Ordnance they operated a trailer camp. Mr Allstott was employed at the Ordnance Depot for 10 years.

They have lived in Hermiston for many years and since retirement have devoted their time to gardening and raising of beautiful flowers.

Both have been active in church work and contribute their long life to their large family of 11 children, 35 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren and also a host of friends.
