County Agent's News (Continued from page 2) tory are not just and reasonable and should not become permanent. This means that the examiner has allowed the railroads to continue the low rates in California and Arizona because of the extensive hauling competition hauling meat from the Mid-West and Texas into California but has denied the rates into the Pacific Northwest because the railroad have not been subject to the same truck competition in that area. Exceptions, to the examiner's report will be filed not later than April 30, 1958 with a definite decision made after that time.

Members of the Livestock Committee of the Morrow County Town and Country Planning Conference and the Morrow County Livestock Growers Association have recommended that

these low rates not be allowed providing eastern grown meat to be shipped in at a much lower freight rate than meat moving from here to the east. It appears that their efforts in joining with other organizations of the Pacific Northwest are bearing fruit. A recent report from USDA and Oregon State college indicates that this year's US winter wheat crop may be the fourth largest on record. As this month started the condition of the nation's winter wheat fields promised a 1958 harvest of 964 million bushels. This is fully 6% above last December's forecast and would be 36% more than last year's harvest and 13% above the ten year average. A smaller acreage of wheat land was placed in the Soil Bank last fall and farmers seeded a sixth larger acreage than the fall of 1956. This was true especially in plains states where weather conditions were much improved. Oregon expects about the same size harvest as in 1957 but Washington's crop looks to be 7% better.

At a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Morrow County Wheat Growers Association there was some discussion on the continued infestation of purple mustard throughout the county. The first purple mustard was found in Morrow county about 9 years ago. The education program which followed encouraging the control of this weed before its spread further evidently needs to be re-emphasized. At the wheat meeting it was pointed out that the weed was spreading into new areas throughout the entire county. In a check made on Tuesday of this week infestations were to be prevalent on many farms. Fortunately the patches are small in most cases and if identified now, can be controlled before they spread. The weed is not easily

controlled by 2,4-D at the time of spraying of other weeds in the wheat. As much as one and one half pounds of actual acid of 2,4-D is needed to kill purple mustard. It is most easily controlled while in the small rosette stage. The weed can be easily found as it has made an active growth this spring. Those who cannot identify the weed by its mustard type leaves and a small purple flower can see a specimen here at the office.

enough raw materials—feeds—on hand at all times of the year. Cows eat every day, the bulletin explains, but grass only grows part of each year and varies in quality with the season. How to make proper use of the range at different seasons, proper distribution of livestock on the range, right kind and number of livestock to keep, and how to develop a year-around plan for providing feed are explained in the bulletin. The illustrated bulletin was written by E R Jackman, OSC extension range management specialist; Elgin Cornett, Deschutes county extension agent; Art Sawyer, superintendent of the Squaw Butte-Harney experiment station, Burns; C E Poulton, OSC associate professor of range management; and Joe Johnson, OSC associate professor of animal husbandry. 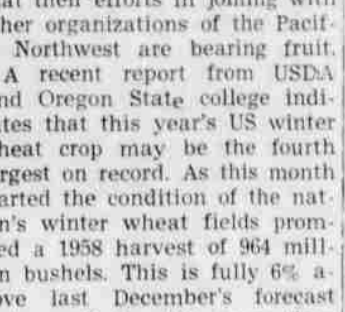
