

Burglars Hit Two Boardman Stores

Burglars took cash and tools with a total value of more than \$1,250 from a Boardman cafe early last Friday morning. Entrance in both cases was gained by forcing open a back door.

\$20 in cash and more than \$1,000 worth of tools, including a 20-ton hydraulic jack and hand tools and electric drills, was taken from Kuhn's Garage between midnight and 7:45 am. The burglary was discovered by Ed Kuhn, owner, when he opened up.

The loss at the M & M Cafe, owned by Mrs Maxine Crowder and Mrs Mabel Peck, was about \$250. The cafe normally banks Friday, but banked on Thursday last week, so the loss could have been much more. The cafe stays open for business until 3:00 am and opens again at 4:30 am and the burglary occurred during the closing hours. It was discovered by Mrs Peck when she opened up for the day.

State police said they obtained fingerprints at both locations, but have no other clues. State police from Arlington are investigating.

Ed Kuhn said the lost tools was not covered by insurance.

stocks can be expected to decline toward the support price for the new crop. Teal states.

Feed grains have little chance of bringing better prices than last year due to a further build-up of carryover stocks across the country, he continued. Recently announced national support price for 1958-crop oats is the same as last year, but the rate on barley is two cents lower. Malting barley price levels are expected to tie closely to feed barley prices.

Growers of feed grains are advised to make arrangements for suitable storage to qualify for government supports since prices are likely to drop below support levels at harvest time.

Teal sees little chance for improvement in hay prices in 1958. Stocks are large in producing areas as a result of lighter feeding during the mild winter. Prices have some chance of going higher next fall if mouse-damage to hay fields proves as severe as some areas report.

The 1958 price picture for most

turf seeds is about the same as last year. Supplies of fine fescues are reported moving well, and use of turf seeds is likely to continue heavy around homes and schools, along highways, and in recreation areas.

Common ryegrass seed prices are looking up slightly, partly as a result of short crops in Europe and New Zealand. Alfalfa and red clover seed harvests have declined during the past two years, bringing fair chance for price improvements, Teal noted.
