Game, Bird Count High in District

Mule deer population trends have been completed by the Oregon State game commission in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties and they show a 13 percent increase in the number of deer over 1957. Mild weather conditions during the winter prevented any deer loss from malnutrition.

Elk numbers show an 11 percent increase which was due to a good calf crop last spring. Deer and elk have begun their summer migration into the higher elevations to have their young which occurs in May and June and people finding fawn deer or calf elk are in violation of the law if they molest or have them in their possession.

The commission also reports that upland game numbers in the three counties are the highest since recording have been made. Upland game hunters can anticipate excellent shooting this fall should weather conditions permit good hatching of birds. Two hundred and fifty-five Mongolian pheasant which were ready to nest were released in the three counties. The Chukar partridge is well established and should provide good hunting in the future. Sportsmen in Arlington and Boardman have received 500 pheasant eggs, 400 chukar eggs and 175 bobwhite eggs for hatching and release this summer.

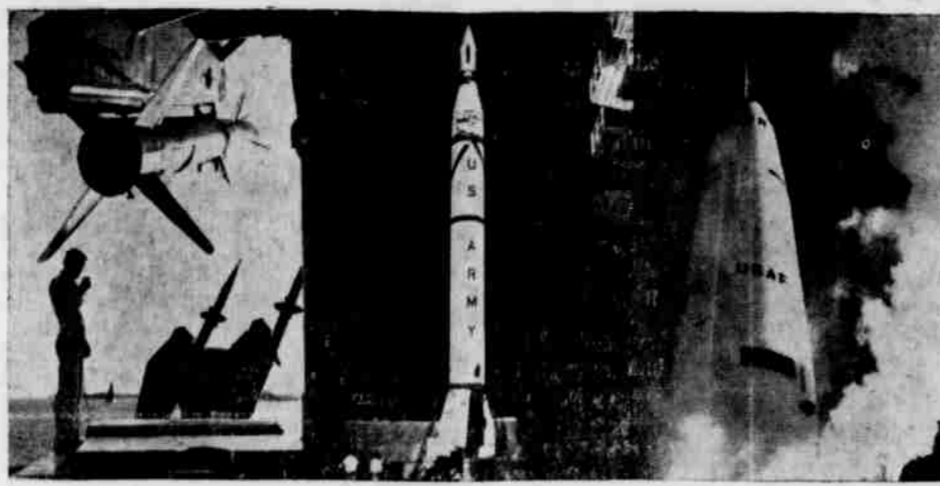

Ordnance Depot Sets Armed Forces Day Open House

The most powerful peacetime force in U S history—its men, ships, planes and missiles strategically located around the world in combat readiness against any emergency—will spearhead the observance of the ninth Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 17.

In observance of this day, Colonel Cam Longley, Jr, commanding officer of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot, Ordnance, cordially extends his invitation to the public to attend "Open House" at the depot.

We will do everything possible within security regulations to enable our citizens to see the mighty forces that have been created as a "Power for Peace" against the threat of Communist aggression, "Longley said. "This will be no small celebration. Senator Wayne Morse will be the principal speaker. The program at the depot will include as a major display, a full size actual model of our satellite, "EXPLORER I", complete with antenna and cut away to show inside working details. This will be the first appearance of the Explorer on the west coast to our knowledge."

The depot will include in its program a variety of other displays to include NIKE-AJAX missiles, helicopters, small arms such as machine guns, mortars, etc. There will be tours of the explosive areas by trains and busses. Visitors will see large displays of live ammunition of many types and ammunition operating equipment of many varieties. The administrative area will be alive with "county fair" type displays of various armed forces equipment items. Movies will be run continuously, and in addition, there will be a color slide "tour" of the Hanford atomic works. The depot cafeteria will be open to serve ham and turkey dinners at nominal cost. There will be soft drinks and hot dogs.

Compared to have the time of your lives," the Colonel adds, "We are doing all within our power to make this Armed Forces Day the most memorable yet."

Condon Air Base Slates Open House

The Condon Air Force Station will join with other units of the Armed Forces to celebrate Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 17.

The 636th Aircraft Control and Warning squadron at Condon, one of the many command units which protect U S borders, will hold open house from 11 am to 4 pm that day. The public will be given guided tours of the base, including the radar tower and operating section. Many sections will have displays prepared; there will be drill team and fire-fighting demonstrations, and a simulated search and rescue mission staged by the local Civil Air Patrol. Arrangements have been made for a low-level flyover by some of the Air Defense Command's latest fighter-interceptors.

Light refreshments will be served in the dining hall and a bus run is scheduled for those who do not wish to drive the seven miles from Condon to the base. Buses will leave from the Condon bank every hour between 11 am and 3 pm.

WATER PROSPECTS EXCELLENT DUE TO HEAVY RAINS AND SNOWPACK

Abnormally heavy precipitation in April increased the snowpack in the higher elevations and added to an already adequate water supply outlook for farmers in Umatilla, Morrow and Gilliam counties. Recent floods resulted largely from heavy rainfall which added to snow-melt runoff, according to a report released today by W T Frost, Snow

survey supervisor for U S Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service and Oregon agricultural experiment station.

Water content of the snowpack is many times greater than last year at this date. This is due in part to continued snow accumulation and to delayed melt. Tollgate snow has a water content of 32.7 inches compared to 15.6 inches last year. Arbutus Mountain snow has 10.2 inches of water while there was none at this time last year.

Watershed soils are well saturated with moisture penetrating well beyond the fourth foot. This condition will favor a well sustained streamflow.

Stored water supplies are excellent with both Cold Spring and McKay Reservoirs full and more water available.

Forecasts for above normal flows during the April-September period indicate the Walla Walla near Milton will discharge 114 percent of average, the Umatilla at Pendleton 110 percent of average and McKay Creek 135 percent of average. Excellent spring and early summer flows of Birch, Butter, Willow, Rhea and Rock Creeks, and other small streams, will be the rule with late season flows about average.
