Over 50 Carcasses Condemned in March

Fifteen sheep, 34 head of cattle and eight swine were condemned by state meat inspectors during March, according to

figures just released by the state department of agriculture. Four sheep were rejected on live inspection; the 53 other condemnations were made after slaughter. Throughout the state 18,385 animals were inspected—8,069 cattle, 1,209 calves, 474 sheep, 8,418 swine, six goats and 210 horses.

The condemnation percentage in March was 0.31 which is slightly lower than the 0.35 percent recorded for January and February.

More than 5000 livers were discarded as unfit for human consumption in March. Fluke in cow livers and parasites in swine livers were the most usual causes of condemnation. Abscesses were also reasons for rejection. In March 300 heads, 51 hearts, 19 kidneys and 35 tongues were also condemned, along with 155 pounds of assorted sausage products and 12 pounds of ham.
