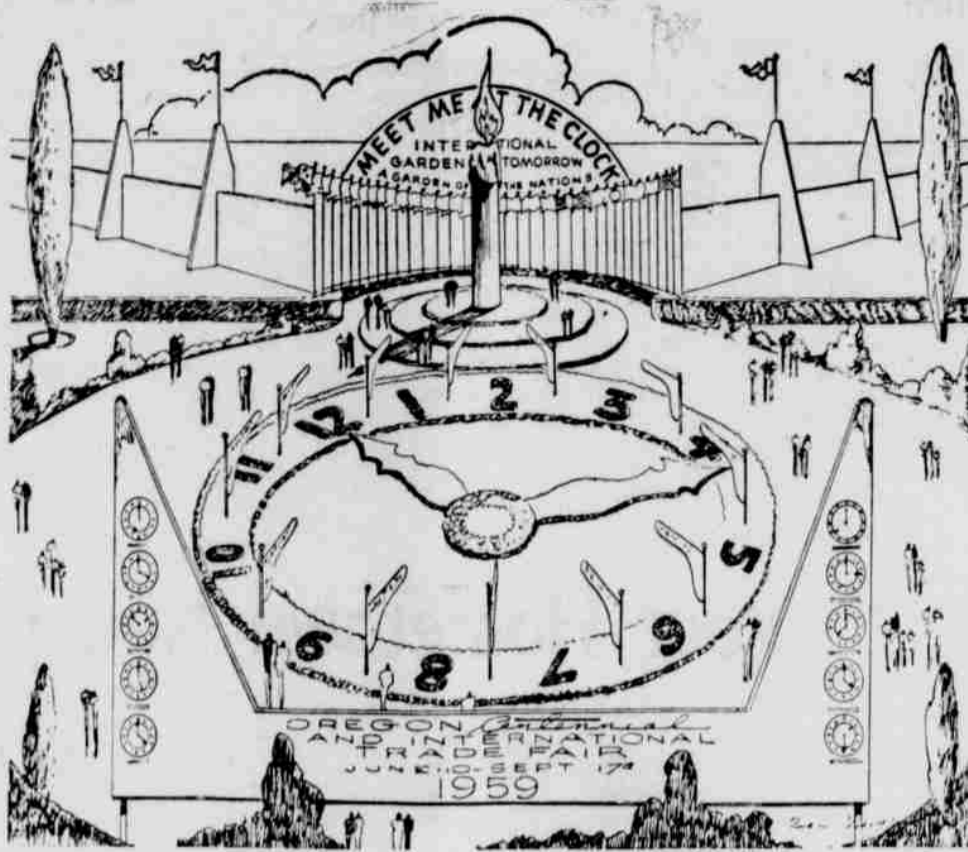

Johnson urged the public against buying from these dealers, pointing out that by doing so, the buyer forfeits all his rights in court.

WARNING OF "SUMMER ICE"
Warm days fix things for treacherous "summer ice" after the first slight shower. The warmer the weather and the lighter the shower the more dangerous are driving conditions, warns the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The "ice" is caused by the rain mixing with accumulated oil and can prove dangerously slippery to unwary motorists. Drivers should automatically slow down after a summer rain because slippery roads mean longer stopping distances. The worst hazard is the driver who unsuspectingly hits the brakes.

WOULD RESTRAIN GOVERNOR
Appeal has been filed in the Oregon Supreme Court by John W Eacret and his wife to restrain Governor Holmes from commuting the death sentence of Billy Nunn to life imprisonment. Nunn was convicted of first degree murder in connection with the sex slaying of the Eacret's 14-year-old son in Jackson County.

Two death sentences have been commuted by Holmes.

Loyd Topping has succeeded John J Jones as administration assistant to Senator Richard L Neuberger, Jones resigned to enter work as a consultant in public relations in Washington, D C. Senator Neuberger, who said he regretted Jones' resignation and commented on his "integrity, ability and character."

RECORD FRUIT SHIPMENTS
In the fiscal year ending June 30 shipments of fresh fruits and vegetables in Oregon totaled 39, 410 cars, second only to the 1950-51 figure by about 1500 cars, the State Agricultural Department reported Thursday.

The shipments included 24,501 carloads of potatoes, a gain of 1,400 over the preceding year.

Shipments of all commodities exceeding the 1956-57 total by 1,800 cars.

Last year's totals included: onions, 4,500 cars; pears, 7,100; apples, 1,900; filberts, 700; walnuts, 230.

Initiative Petition Gets Many Signatures

Tabulation shows 60,661 certified signatures on initiative petitions placing on next November's state ballot a constitutional amendment covering the eligibility of persons to serve in the legislature, according to the Oregon Education Association.

The official count of the secretary of state's office has just been received by the association, according to Executive Secretary Cecll W Posey. The signatures were 12,519 more than the 48,142 necessary to qualify the measure on the November ballot.

Association officials believe the 60,661 signatures the largest number ever placed on file for a state constitutional initiative. Certified signatures were filed for every county in the state except

Wallowa. OEA officials were unable to account for the disqualification of 115 signatures which they had received from Wallowa county and which were not shown in the official summary.

Petitions circulated in Morrow county accounted for 307 of the signatures.

More Vets Farm Units Near Pasco To Go on Sale

War veterans are offered preference in the purchase of 14 full-time farm units currently offered in the southern tip of the Columbia Basin project near Pasco, Washington, Vere A McCarty, service division manager for the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported today.

Veterans' applications must be filed by August 15 with the Bureau of Reclamation, Ephrata, Washington, to be included in the public drawing for the lands. Application forms may be obtained in Oregon from county veterans' officers or the state veterans' department in Salem and Portland.

The farm units range in size from 71 to 159 irrigable acres, and will be sold to winners in the public drawing at prices

ranging from \$1715 to \$2687. Veterans must have served for 90 days or more between September 16, 1940, and January 31, 1955, to qualify. They must have had at least two years of full-time experience and must possess assets amounting to at least \$8500 in excess of liabilities, of which at least \$5000 must be in cash, or must possess at least \$7500 in cash.

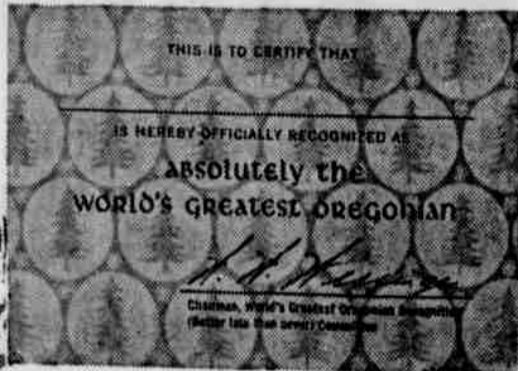
