Jack Cavender was in John Day Friday on school business.

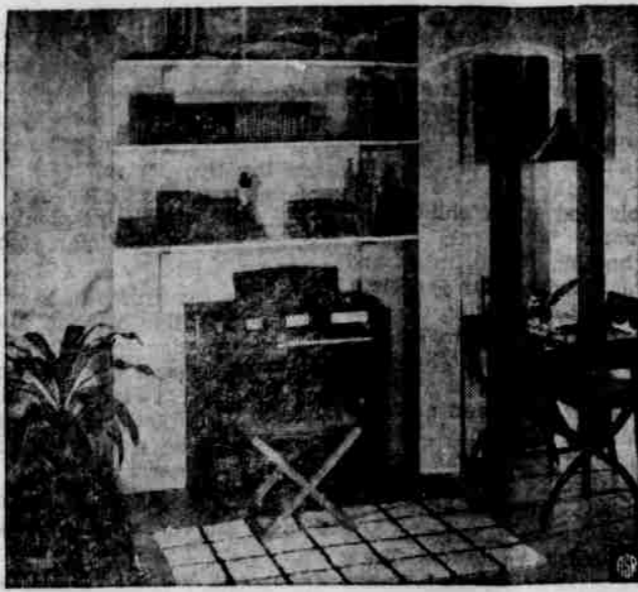
Miss Gracie Hunt took care of the three Hutchison children while Roenia was in Pendleton for a few days.

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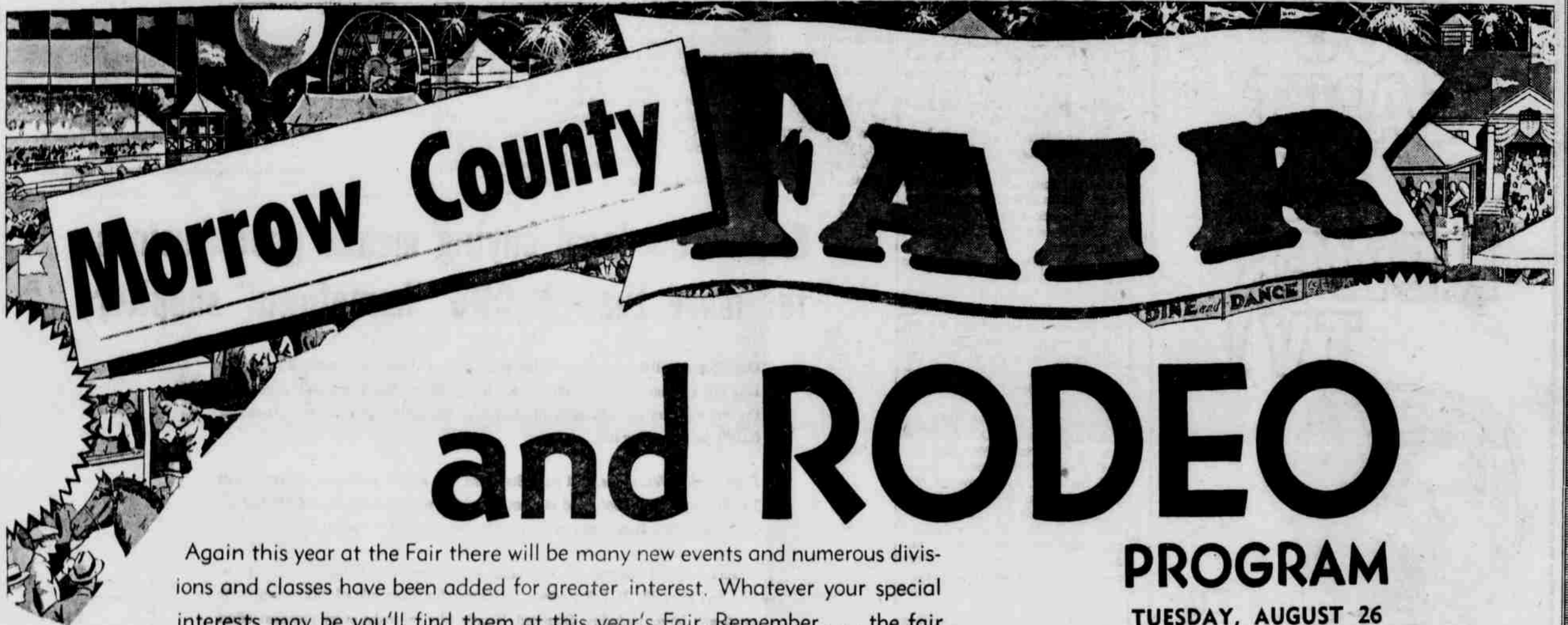
