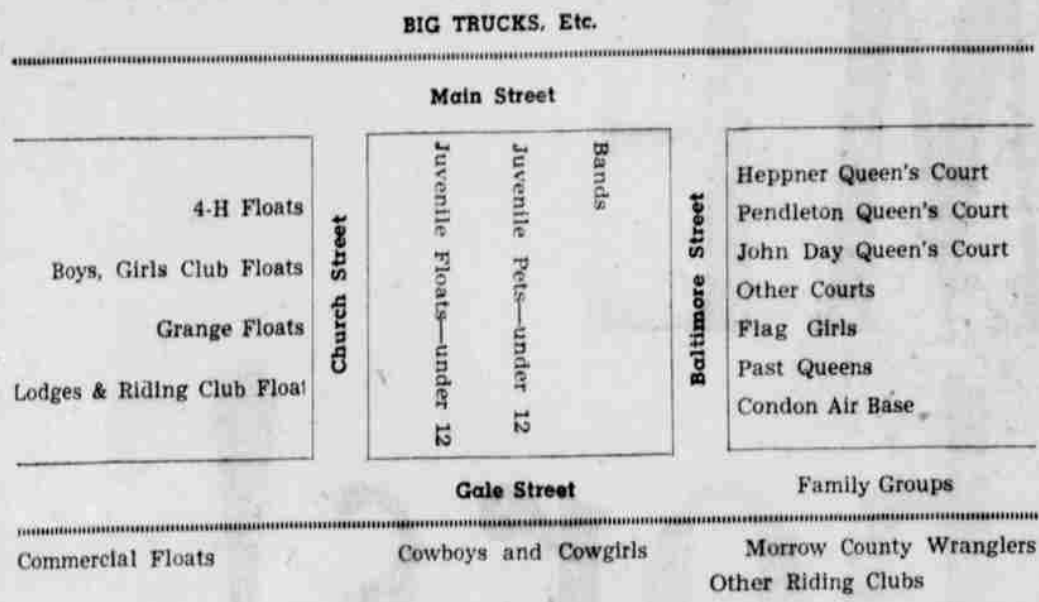


MAP SHOWING POSITIONS FOR PARADE LINEUP



Car Strikes Two Pedestrians at Boardman Friday

Lloyd Prevalyn Harr, 62, and his wife, Nina Mae, 58, of Route 1, Hardesty, Okla., are in serious condition at St. Anthony's hospital in Pendleton after being struck by an automobile at Boardman last Friday night about seven o'clock.

The attending physician said the couple was doing as well as could be expected. Each suffered a fractured leg and arm, and Mrs. Harr had a fractured skull.

State police at Arlington said the car was driven by Clifford Nestor Olson, 6362 N Vancouver Avenue, Portland. He was accompanied by his wife, Mary Irene. The car was eastbound. The accident occurred on a four-lane stretch of highway 30 as it passes through Boardman. Mr. and Mrs. Harr were registered at a local motel, and were crossing the highway from the motel to

a restaurant when they were struck by the passing car. State police are still investigating.

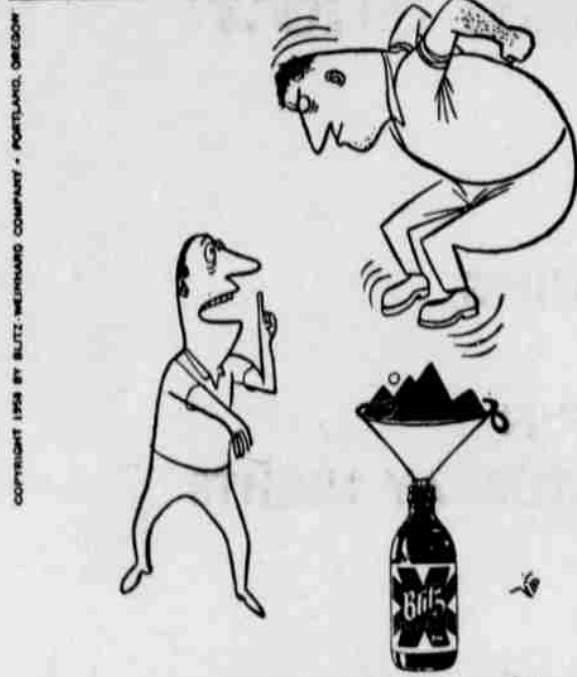
