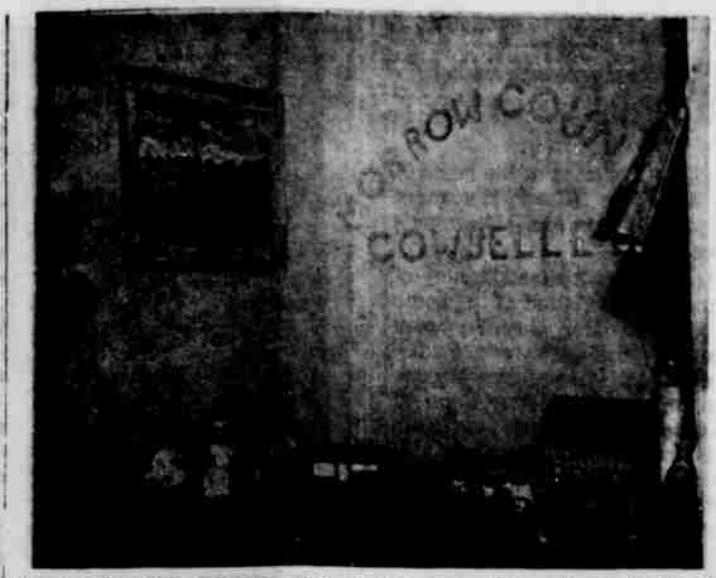

visit relatives and attend the State fair.

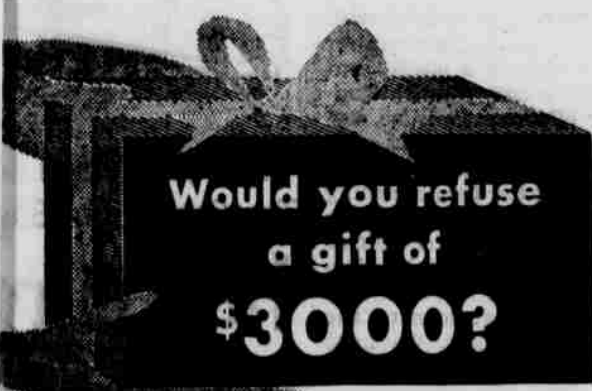
