Other topics to be on the unit's yearly program include "use of Oregon wheat products," "color," "outdoor barbecuing," "new fabrics and finishes" and "holiday fun" (a crafts lesson). A public meeting on seafoods preparation will be presented by the sea foods laboratory of Seattle sometime in January.
