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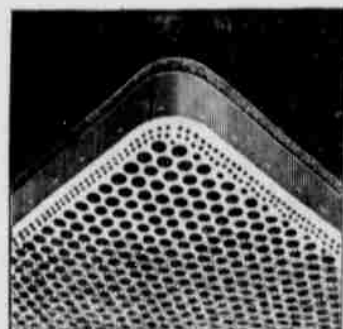


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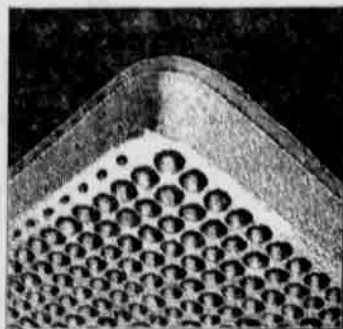

Many farmers now agree that "the real cost of fertilizer" must be figured in terms of gain or loss in yield and profit produced, rather than just dollars-per-ton actually paid for the fertilizer. Here are two ways to figure this "real cost".

1. ORIGINAL COST PLUS LOSS IN YIELD: One case history reports a grain grower bought his ammonia at \$30 per ton less than the going price in his area. This bargain purchase forced him to handle all the application without technical service. He missed the most profitable application rate and his yield brought him \$7.50 per acre less profit than his neighbor. He figured that one ton of ammonia fertilized 16 acres at 100 lbs. N per acre, so he multiplied his \$7.50 per acre loss times 16 acres to make a loss equal to \$120 per ton of ammonia. This made his "real cost":

Original cost (\$30 less than dealer price) plus \$120 loss in yield = \$90/ton more than dealer price.

2. ORIGINAL COST MINUS GAIN IN YIELD: The neighbor who paid market price for his ammonia with a service program, and got \$7.50 per acre more in yield, had a "real cost" of:

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
