

Mustangs Continue to Roll; Sink Fossil 32-0

The Heppner Mustangs are off with flying colors this year as they took Wheeler County Union High 30-0 Friday on the local field.

The Mustangs first tally came in the first 2 minutes of play when they marched 82 yards in 6 plays with Dick Ruhl going over from 25 yards out. Steven Flug went up the middle for the PAT.

Heppner's second score came in the second period with Ruhl going over gain from the three yard line on a pass from Tom Driscoll. The Mustangs marched 42 yards in 5 plays.

The third period was the Mustangs' big one putting 13 points on the score board. The first TD was on a blocked punt by Dan Brosnan who also fell on it. On the next play Ruhl ran 20 yards for the TD. The fourth counter came when Heppner went 79 yards in 8 plays with Driscoll going over from the one. Ruhl went over for the PAT.

Heppner's fifth and final touchdown came on the most spectacular play of the game when Robert Nichols broke through and interrupted a lateral then raced 65 yards for the TD. The Falcons failed to score in the game and did not get closer than the 30 yard line.

Ruhl was Heppner's top gainer

with 107 yards in 11 carries for 9 yards per carry.

Miller was Fossil's top gainer with 70 yards in 12 for 5.8 yards a carry.

The Mustangs had 400 rushing yards with 7 first downs while Fossil had 219 rushing yards with 10 first downs.

Friday, October 3 Heppner plays Pilot Rock at home and promises to be a hard fought and good game. Game time at the rodeo field is 8 p m.

The handbook, published by the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, lists home shelter preparations, Conelrad instructions, fallout protection, decontamination and radiological monitoring information, and evacuation planning.

College Prep Help To Be Offered to Heppner Students

A guidance session covering preparation for college or other training beyond the high school level will be held for the students of Heppner high school on October 3 at 9:00 am. Principal Gordon Pratt announced that a visiting team from the state system of higher education has been invited to conduct the meeting.

The state system team will include the executive secretary of the high school-college relations committee of the state board of higher education, Francis B Nickerson; representative from each state institution or higher education; and a representative from Oregon Technical Institute. The importance of education beyond high school and the urgency of adequate preparation early in the high school years will be explained. A description of what "adequate preparation" entails, career opportunities, costs, scholarships, and mechanics of school application and entrance will be stressed.

Representatives from each of the state schools will explain their respective academic offerings and point up each institution's specific requirements. Opportunity for questions by students is given to provide individual guidance.

These informative sessions are conducted annually in the high school as part of the regular guidance program. They represent a combined effort by the state system of higher education and the high school to better prepare high school students for their future careers. The program presents complete information on the educational opportunities provided at public expense within the state.

BIG NAMES STIR POLITICS

Events of the past week put big name punch into what was settling into a junior grade political campaign. Ex-president Harry Truman pyramided the public vs private power issue into a major campaign topic at a \$25-a-plate fund raising dinner in Portland Saturday night. He accused Republicans of blacking out industrial progress in the Northwest, to please jealous Northwest manufacturers, by giving dam sites to private corporations.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson was in Salem Wednesday and Thursday conferring with James Short, Republican state central committeeman at party headquarters. He spoke briefly at a public reception at Marlon County GOP headquarters from eight to ten Wednesday evening. On Thursday Benson toured farm areas in Marion and Polk counties, sandwiched a no host luncheon at noon at the Senator to touring chores in the afternoon.

Vice President Richard Nixon arrived in Portland October 3rd at 3 p m, was tendered a public reception in the evening and spoke briefly to an enthusiastic no host gathering of Republicans.

Honorarium To Third Estate
Governor Holmes this week gave a 6-year term on the State Board of Education to a man who had worked his way through college and after attaining a nationally successful writing career returned to his college, started and headed a department of education for eight years.

Ralph P Stuller for more than a decade editor and publisher of the prosperous Coquille Valley Sentinel received the educational accolade.

Some of his editorials on education have been printed in the Congressional Record. He is state chairman of the National Editorial Association.

An active Democrat, Stuller organized the Yamhill County Democrats in 1934 and has served as their president for two years.

ANOTHER OREGON FIRST

The largest concentration of heavy equipment ever assembled on a highway job is in use on the southwest Oregon Coast where a record 11,000,000 cubic yards of earth and rock are being excavated along 16 miles of the proposed relocation route of the Gold Beach-Brookings section of Highway 101.

Four sections of the new 27.5 mile, two-lane highway that are now under contract lie between the Pistol River and Brookings.

The terrain in this area is spectacular. Canyons ranging from 100 to 200 feet deep are being filled. Thomas Creek Canyon, over 360-feet deep, will be span-

ned by a metal 340-foot high structure, the highest in the state. The bridge and the surfacing of the highway are expected to be completed in 1961.

The new highway, when finished, will eliminate the 35.5 mile Gold Beach-Brookings section of Highway with its 206 curves over 20 degrees. The relocated highway will allow the present travel time of over one hour of hard driving to cut to 40 minutes or less.

New employer representatives on the council, which guides Oregon's active apprenticeship program, are W F Zimmerman, Pendleton electrical contractor, who succeeds W C Oettinger for a term expiring June 8, 1959; W W Bristol, Eugene jeweler, who succeeds Alfred S Teller, for a term expiring June 8, 1960 and E Glen Craven, Portland director of Portland Painting Contractors Assn, for a term expiring June 8, 1961.

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State Road Fund Distribution Made

More than \$2 1/2 million in Department of Motor Vehicles' receipts has been transferred to the state highway fund for distribution to counties, the department reported today.

The \$2,563,467.99 represents a portion of receipts for the third quarter of 1958.

This amount compares with \$2,283,800.55 distributed during the third quarter of 1957.

Morrow county will receive \$9,740.56, which is 379976 percent of the state total.

The department pointed out that this distribution was from fuel taxes, motor vehicle registrations and driver's license receipts only. Other receipts by the public utilities commission for weight-mile taxes will subsequently be added to make up the bulk of the total moneys distributed.

Distribution is made on the basis of the number of vehicles registered by counties. From the total highway fund, 19% of receipts is distributed back to counties for use in road building and maintenance.
