

PR Dumps Mustangs For First Loss, 26-6

The Heppner High Mustangs suffered their first defeat of the season Friday night on their home field, to the Pilot Rock Rockets 26-6.

During the first half the game was a tight one—at half time the score was 7-6 Pilot Rock.

Heppner's lone touchdown came in the second quarter when Dick Ruhl went over from the 1 yard line. The Mustangs went 39 yards in 8 plays.

Pilot Rock's first tallies came in the second quarter when Ken Corbit went down from 1 yard out. The PAT was kicked by Fred Wyatt.

The Rockets big quarter was third in which they racked up 12 points. The first touchdown came as Wyatt went over from 2 out. They made 26 yards in 8 plays. The play was set up on a fumble by Heppner.

The Rockets second touchdown in this third period was as Dwayne Suliste broke open on a reverse and went 66 yards for the score. On this play the Rockets went 69 yards in 3 plays.

The fourth and final tally for Pilot Rock came in the fourth quarter when Corbit went over again from 3 out. The PAT was by Wyatt's toe.

The Mustangs gained a total of 196 yards and 11 first downs, while the Rockets had 318 yards gained with 13 first downs.

The top yardage gained for Pilot Rock was Dwayne Suliste with 124 in 10 carries for an average of 12.4 per carry. Heppner's top was Ruhl with 84 in 14 carries for 6 per carry.

Top defensive men for Heppner were Ruhl, Mahoney and Driscoll.

LILIAN C TURNER FOUNDATION WORKS TO FURTHER EDUCATION

A well-known benevolent organization in Morrow county is the Lilian C Turner Foundation, named after a much-loved educator who died in 1947. New residents of the area may not be acquainted with the purposes of the organization, and for that reason the following history of it is being published.

In the year 1901 in Heppner at the graduation of the high school there was one Lilian C Cockran, who had as her deepest desire the urge to become a teacher—not just a teacher, but a successful one, with the thought of the pupil uppermost in mind. She had been doing some substitute teaching under professor Reid of Heppner, and immediately after graduation she started in the profession, going to Grant county where she taught until 1906. The following years found her teaching in Heppner and on Dec 25, 1909 she married Frank Turner of that city. She continued with her teaching for quite a number of years with some time out when her children were small. In 1925 Mrs Turner started teaching in Lexington, and during the time in Lexington she taught at different times, the 5th and 6th grades, and the 7th and 8th, the latter being her real job and the one she liked the most. In 1935 she went to Hardman where she remained for one year, returning to Lexington in 1936 and remained there until 1944 when she left the teaching profession because of illness. During all the years of her teaching she realized the all-importance of a higher education for high school graduates, and upon her death in 1947 she left an endowment to be used in some way to further this realization.

The annual meeting shall be the Saturday in May coming before Mother's Day.

The dues shall be \$2.00 per person and the money added to the loan fund. Money shall be loaned on a two-year term, bearing interest at 3% annually. These notes shall be renewed by a majority vote of the board of directors. Persons in the armed forces have the same privileges except those who make the service a career. Persons under age must have a co-signer.

At the meeting in 1951 the names of 162 ex-students and supporting members were read, since then the dues have been collected yearly and a smorgasbord held several times with the proceeds to further the cause. There have been two worthwhile loans made to high school graduates.

The board of directors at the present time are: William J Van Winkle (Bill), Gene Cutsforth, E E Peck, Juanita Martin, who is also treasurer, and Edith Munkers, secretary, all of Lexington, and Clayton Davis, a director, of Pendleton.

In the year 1949 a group of her students met at the Lexington I O O F hall on May 14 and formed what is now known as the Lilian C Turner Foundation.
