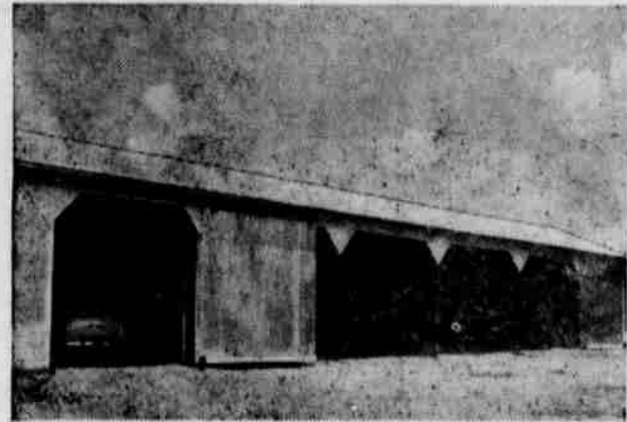
Mr and Mrs Sam Scott and son drove to Vale for the weekend to visit his mother and other relatives.

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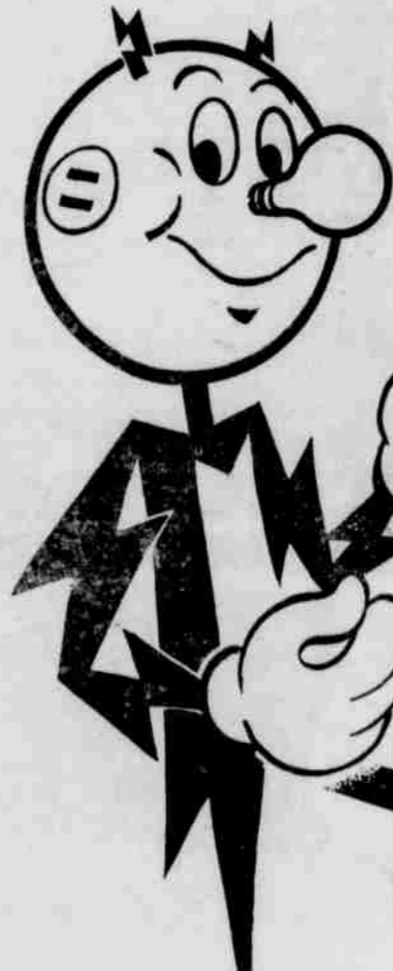
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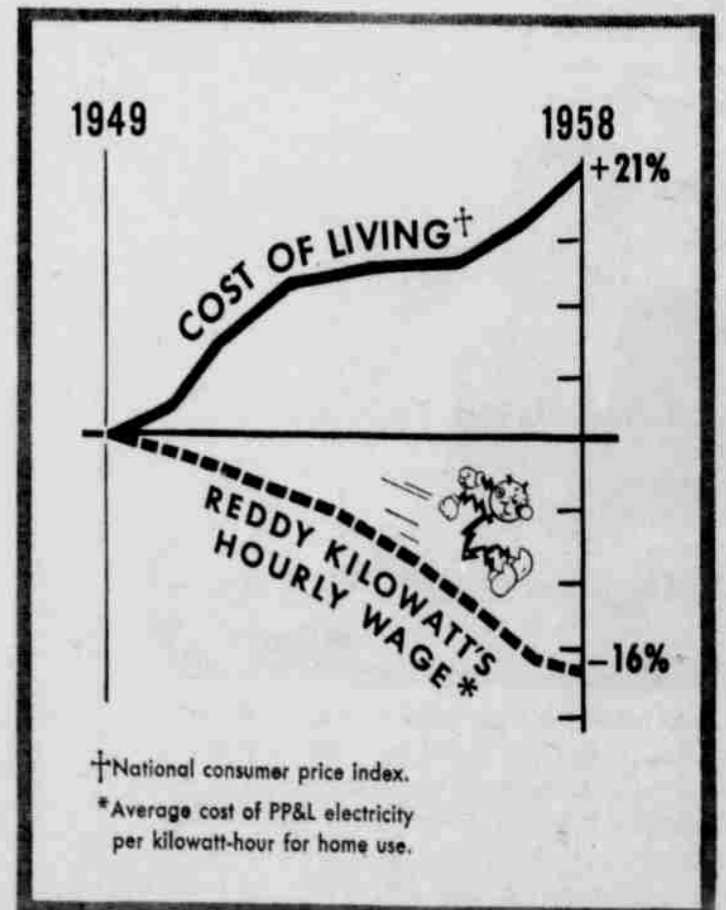
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
