Kansas City, Mo.—Dennis Doherty of Heppner Oregon today was named to junior membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

Sixty-four junior Hereford breeders were placed on the association's official roster during October. The association maintains active accounts for more than 80,000 breeders of registered Herefords over the nation.

The Hereford Association during the last fiscal year recorded 453,632 purebred calves. The year's total recordings were the seventh highest on record and more than 223,000 above the combined registrations of other major beef breeds.

Decline Seen In Savings Bonds Sales During Past Month

Sales of E and H savings bonds in Morrow county last month were \$25,346, compared to \$59,102 a year ago, according to county chairman, Jack Bedford. In reporting these sales, the county chairman said that October a year ago was by far the best sales month in 1957 in most counties, and in the state at large. State-wide savings bonds sales last month were \$3,387,714. A year ago they totaled \$4,860,451.

"Many economists feel that a new wave of opportunity is coming," the chairman said when discussing the value of bonds to the community, state and nation. "Our reserves are going up. Today we have \$340 billion in all forms of savings available for future spending. This compares with \$68½ billion in 1940. Even with inflation, our savings are three times what they were then. More and more Americans own shares of their country's productive enterprise. More than 8½ million have bought stocks of US corporations. Another 100 million own stocks indirectly through investments in life insurance companies and banks, in which millions of Americans have an interest through their savings."
