JUVENILE DELINQUENTS
 Jurisdiction of juvenile delinquents should be transferred from county courts to circuit courts according to findings in a legislative interim committee report made after extensive research and numerous hearings, which were conducted since the late special session of the Legislature.

If and when the committee acts on the matter at the 1959 session there will be opposition coming from members of the Association of Oregon counties.

County Courts now have jurisdiction to handle such cases in counties of less than 100,000 population. In counties with greater population Circuit Courts have jurisdiction.

HATFIELD STORY FOR POST
 A story on Gov-elect Mark Hatfield as the youngest Republican governor will appear in a February issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

Milton MacKaye, feature writer of the Post arrived in Salem this week to begin a profile story with illustrations by Post artists and photographers. The renowned Post writer met Hatfield upon his return Friday from Hawaii, where he had attended a western Republican conference.

EXPLAINS SLY REPORT
 A preliminary meeting is being set up for Saturday, January 10, at 10 a m in the House chamber of the Capitol, when an official explanation of the Oregon tax structure will be made by a New Jersey tax consultant, Dr John F Sly.

OREGON AIDS CD PLANS
 Oregon is one of eight states being used in a pilot program of standardizing Civil Defense plans and in preparing material for the joint Congressional appropriations committee, Col Arthur M Sheets, state civil defense director, said Wednesday.

The announcement was made following a series of conferences this week with a team of federal civil defense officials.

Purpose of the program is to gather information to support recommendations to be made to the Congress in implementing a new law to establish joint responsibility for civil defense by federal, state and local governments on a matching fund basis.

State civil defense plans, including continuity and civil service merit will be used to determine state eligibility under the program.

PHONE RATE BOOST CUT
 Only about half the increase the West Coast Telephone Co asked for was granted by Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan. New rates will apply to the Beaverton, Coos Bay and LaGrande districts.

He made it plain that the company had been held to a low figure because of its failure to pursue victoriously a program of improvement of service and customer relations.

RETAIL MEAT WEIGHT EYED
 Discrepancies in prices on meats where a retailer may charge for the gross weight, although the packaged meat or poultry specifies the net weight, has been brought to the attention of the state agriculture department.

O K Beals, of the department emphasizes that all labels must indicate the name of the packer, distributor, or producer of product, and the net weight.

Most violations coming to light are small but they are sufficient to amount to a violation of Oregon's food misbranding laws, even though the violation may be accidental.

GREYHOUNDS SIDETRACKED
 The long litigation over a greyhound racing plant in Eugene ended Wednesday when the State Supreme Court denied an appeal from Greyhound Park, Inc.

The park sued the State Racing Commission after it couldn't get a license in 1954. When the Marion County Circuit Court ruling was adverse, the park took the matter to the highest state court.

The court, in its decision by Justice William McAllister, ruled that the question was rendered moot because the legislature gave the racing commission clear powers to grant or deny a racing license.

Since this case started in 1954 the racing laws were strengthened by the Legislature in 1955 and 1957. At both sessions it was agreed that the racing commission had been doing a good job and the state's interest and financial returns should be safeguarded.

One of the popular positions the racing board took in denying the Eugene plea was similar to the denial of liquor sales near the state university.

Tag Needed For National Forest Christmas Trees
 Persons who wish to obtain a Christmas tree from National Forest lands should call at one of the six district ranger offices or the Forest Supervisor's Office

Supervisor Rector said that in cutting the Christmas tree for which the tag is obtained the person should be guided by the following general rules: (1) The tree to be cut must be at least 200 feet from the road right-of-way. (2) The person should not cut a large tree and then take only the top out of that tree for the Christmas tree. (3) If several trees are to be cut they should not all be cut in one spot as the justification for harvesting Christmas trees is to give growing room to the remaining trees. (4) The stump height should be as low as possible, and the tree should be completely severed from the stump so that it will not remain a host for insect infestations. He also wished to caution that the tag, which is issued by the Forest Service, is only applicable to National Forest lands and much of the lands surrounding the Pendleton area are not National Forest. The person cutting the tree should make sure of the ownership before he exercises his right to cut his Christmas tree.
