New Inspiration For Old-Timer



A wonderful old-timer, stuffed cabbage leaves or cabbage rolls whichever you prefer to call them, is better than ever in its brown-rich, oniony sauce made with canned condensed onion soup. A new inspiration is the tasty corned beef hash-chili sauce stuffing for the cabbage leaves.

With the Hash 'n' Cabbage Rolls, serve buttered canned peas, crunchy radishes, celery and spiced crabapples, salt sticks and peach pie with thick cream.

Hash 'n' Cabbage Rolls

4 large (or 8 medium size) cabbage leaves 1/4 cup chili sauce
1 can (1 lb.) corned beef hash 1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 can condensed onion soup 1 can condensed onion soup

Cook cabbage leaves in enough water to cover until slightly tender, about 10 minutes; drain. Mix hash and chili sauce. Put a mound of hash in each leaf; fold in edges and roll leaf, fastening with toothpicks. Mix cornstarch and soup; cook until thickened, stirring. Put cabbage rolls in soup; cover and simmer until cabbage is tender, 30 to 40 minutes. Four servings.

Christmas Was Once A Movable Feast

Wheat, Feed Grain Surpluses Likely To Increase in '59

Wheat and feed grain surpluses appear likely to pile higher in the year ahead and will undoubtedly force drastic changes in farm programs, says an Oregon state college marketing specialist.

Record carry-over of wheat, corn, sorghums, oats, and barley are in prospect for mid-1959, reports Ray Teal, OSC extension seed marketing specialist.

Corn farmers in the 26 commercial corn-growing states recently voted in a new support program that lifts corn acreage restrictions for the first time since 1938. Teal says the national average support price for 1959 crop will be about \$1.12 to \$1.15 a bushel.

Minus acreage allotments, corn production could increase greatly and put added pressure on other surplus feed grains. Teal says some farm groups are now discussing such "corrective" programs as "bushel allotments" rather than acreage allotments for feed grains of all kinds.

Under a bushel allotment program, a farmer could elect to plant more acres with less fertilizer or fewer acres with more fertilizer as best suited his situation.

Wheat surpluses, still on the

increase, are also likely to force new programs during coming congressional sessions, say agricultural leaders. Wheat acreage permitted under the government support program may be reduced from the present 55 million-acre level, Teal reports. It may also be required that land taken out of wheat production be placed under the conservation reserve. The two-price plan for wheat may again be considered. For 1959, however, there will be little change in the wheat program over 1958, the specialist explains. The national average support level announced last May was \$1.81 a bushel, only 1 cent less than for the 1958 crop.
