I found the library has about seven new books that deal with Oregon history. Two that looked especially good concerned the story of two early cattle kings in Eastern Oregon.

Velma Glass, public health nurse, issued an invitation to attend the Pioneer Memorial Auxiliary meeting in the county courthouse on Monday evening.
