Fish Cookery Demonstrations Are Slated in County

Helen Ruth Groves, home economist for the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Seattle, will demonstrate fish cookery at the two sea foods meetings in Morrow county—January 28 at the Boardman Grange hall and January 29 at the Heppner fair pavilion. Both meetings, open to the public, will begin at 1:00 P M. Mrs Groves, a native of Miami, Florida, received a bachelor of science degree in home economics education from Florida State University. Following graduation in 1948, she was employed as a teacher with the public school system in Miami and taught Homemaking education for three years.

In 1951 she took a leave of absence from teaching in order to accept an invitation to become associated with the local television station as the home economist presenting a daily half-hour cooking show known as "Menu Magic." Five years and 1400 television performances later she joined the Fish and Wildlife Service as one of the home economists with the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Seattle. Her current home base is the new test kitchen in the branch of market development at Seattle.

The test kitchen activities consist of developing consumer-size fish recipes for publications. A great deal of time is spent presenting fish cookery demonstra-

tions in the western area to university and college food classes, and agriculture extension service leader-training meetings. A major portion of the demonstration schedule is given to teaching school-lunch personnel fish cookery methods in large quantity to be used in the public school lunch program.

Peter A Formuzis, who will assist Mrs Groves, is a native of the state of Washington attending school in Tacoma and the State College of Washington at Pullman.

Mr Formuzis has been in the wholesale fish business for over 20 years, learning the trade from his father who started the business in 1906. In 1944, after returning from army service, Mr Formuzis was advanced to manager of the company, having supervision over all phases of the operation. He maintained this position until July 1958 when he joined the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, branch of market development, as a fishery marketing specialist.

Both Mrs Groves and Mr Formuzis are well qualified to present these sea food cookery demonstrations in the county.

The public is invited to attend these demonstrations. A small registration fee of 15 cents at Boardman and 25 cents at Heppner will be charged to defray expenses of the demonstration. Dishes prepared by the home economist will be given out as door prizes.

UP Agricultural Train Due January 23

Union Pacific's S O S (Save Our Soil) train will bring farmers in eight eastern Oregon communities in January ideas about how they can stop losing carloads of valuable top soil each year.

Cal Crandall, U P agricultural agent, has assembled a crew of conservation specialists on the railroad's agricultural improvement car to combat the extreme soil losses that have struck many Oregon farms in the last two years.

Annual runoff losses of soil have been measured as high as from 75 to 139 tons an acre, said Crandall.

To help the farmers stop these serious erosions, the specialists will present practical suggestions on tillage methods, water controls, strip cropping, legume sickness and crop rotation.

Heading the program with Crandall at each stop of the ag car will be the local county agent, soil conservation service technicians and E R Jackman, Oregon State college farm crops specialist.

This is the 12th annual visit of the U P agricultural improvement car to the Northwest. The car has brought 156,783 western stockmen and farmers the latest information on good farming practices.

The car will be in Arlington January 21, Condon, January 22; Heppner, January 23.
