

Boardman, Irrigon Approve County School Proposal

Citizens of Boardman and Irrigon voted unanimously for formation of one school administrative district in Morrow county, at a hearing here Thursday night of last week, with provision for local school committees.

The vote was the same as action taken on the same resolution at hearings in Ione and Heppner last week. Reports from Irrigon P-TA, Irrigon Home Extension Unit and Irrigon Grange also supported the resolution.

Up to this time only one Morrow county community, Cecil, has opposed the administrative unit plan.

After adjournment, a vote by show of hands indicated a unanimous wish to proceed with the administrative district immediately. Fred Martin, Ione, chairman of the Morrow County School Reorganization Committee, said school law does not now provide for local school boards under the administrative district setup, but does provide for a seven-man county wide school board.

Tentative plans are to name the following districts as zones from which one board member would be elected: Irrigon, Boardman, Ione, Lexington, plus former rural Echo and Heppner districts, Heppner and Hardman rural districts and Heppner city.

A present House Bill 4 provides for an improved local committee arrangement for both elementary and high schools.

A provision has been added to allow the local committee to reject a teacher for the following year not later than March 1.

The series is presented by the Oregon Education Association. It is aired over several radio stations in the state including KEX, Portland at 7:45 p m Thursdays.

The Heppner P-TA publicity committee this week said that of particular interest to parents and school patrons involved in reorganization, is Dr James B Conant's first report on his study of secondary education in the U S. In a review of the book, the Oregonian recently reported, "Any school with a graduating class of less than 100 is too small in Dr Conant's view. A table in the book shows that 175 Oregon high schools (78.1 percent) serving 6300 students are too small by this standard.

In a recent speech on education by Dr O Meredith Wilson, president of the University of Oregon, delivered to legislators and civic leaders in Salem, he said that at the moment "we should be congratulating ourselves and gladly making appropriate investment to bring each of our children to his brightest potential. Half the country is cautiously counting the educational pennies as though the perfection of our children were an extravagance rather than a prudent investment."

Don Hatfield is spending some time in Madras, where he is remodeling the Hatfield store there. Mrs John Hatfield, his mother, is spending some time here.

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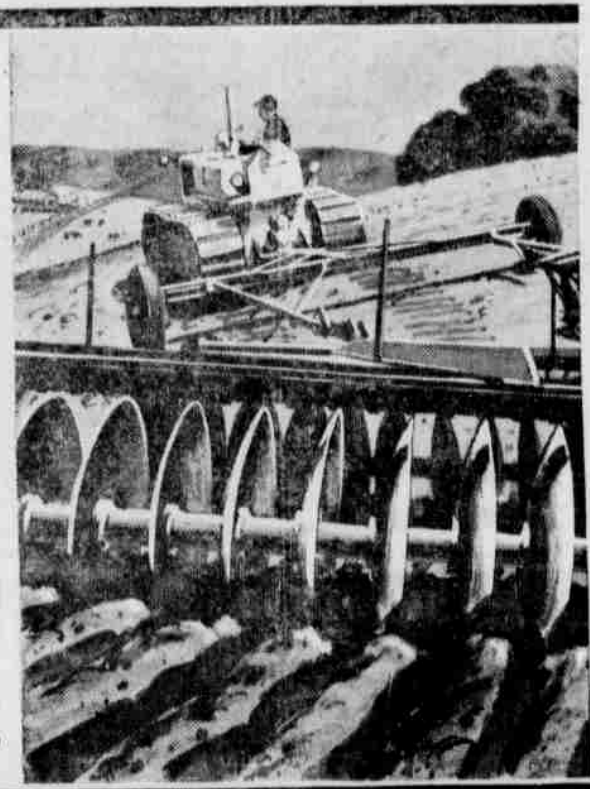
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SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET for the Year 1958-59
