Ten Heppner women, meeting twice a month, processed 1,152 articles of clothing, prepared seven food baskets, six bouquets; helped 98 people and spent 636 hours in work to help humanity during 1958," reported Elsie Huston, leader of the Dorcas and Welfare Society of the Heppner Seventh-day Adventist church.

The labor, figured at 75 cents per hour, plus the value of the clothing, food and flowers would amount to approximately \$2,946.85.

Some of the clothing collected, mended and prepared by this group is given locally, but most of it is shipped to Watsonville, Calif., a distribution center, to be sent from there to disaster areas anywhere in the world.

Clothing given to the society by individuals and the Civic League, that is not sold at the rummage sales, is greatly appreciated by this church group.

"We are not only grateful for the clothing given but also for the cleaning of clothing by the Heppner Cleaners free of charge," Mrs Huston stated.

The pastor of the Seventh-day Adventist church in Heppner, Elder C L Vories, has reported 6,000,000 helped last year through the welfare societies of the world organizations of Seventh-day Adventists.

## Soroptimists Start Great Decisions Study Group Here

The Soroptimist club of Heppner has organized the first "Great Decisions" study group in Morrow county. Seven people met Wednesday evening, February 11 at the home of Mrs Elaine George to start weekly study on nine key problems that the citizens of Oregon face in their state, their nation and the world.

At their first meeting the Soroptimist study group discussed Oregon's history. Information for this study was given in an information-packed "Fact Sheets" prepared by the Foreign Policy Association, a nonprofit, non-partisan, educational agency. Oregon's resources, current problems, forestry, agriculture, and \$400 million annual export-import trade are among the topics to be reviewed at the second meeting. The illustrated fact sheets are "1859-1959. Building Today's Oregon" and "What Frontiers in Oregon's Future?"

Following discussion of Oregon issues, the group will continue an 8 week study of foreign policy problems.

After each topic is studied each person in the study group fills out an opinion ballot. These ballots will be tabulated by Rev Lester Boulden, county Great Decisions chairman, and made known in the community. Through special arrangements these opinions go to the state's Congressmen and to the state departments and policy makers in Congress.

Social studies classes of Heppner, instructed by Roy Kirk, are also using the Great Decisions fact sheets as a part of their class discussions. Similar use is being made of the material by the Ione high school classes.

Readers interested in Great Decisions are urged to tune in Portland TV channel 8 on Sunday afternoons at 3:00 p m to hear of Oregon's outstanding men in education and politics discuss these same topics.

Information on how Great Decisions study groups may be organized, may be obtained from the local county agent's office.
